### APPLE CROP

Best Reports from N. B. and P. E. Island.

Ottawa, July 27.—(Canadian Press.)—The apple crop throughout the Dominion, though seriously affected by recent drought, is still likely to average better than last year.

The best reports, according to the department of Agriculture, come from New Brunswick and P. E. I., where there is a heavy set for all varieties. Baldwin's King, pronounced the best, is the variety but in other varieties there has been a heavy drop. Quebec anticipates a crop something larger than that of last year.

In Ontario about eighty per cent. of that of 1920 is expected. British Columbia expects a crop some ten per cent. better than last year's.

### WAIVING TO BROTHER FALLS TO DEATH

Montreal, July 27.—Seated on the railing of the second story balcony of 324 Adam street last night and waving to his brother, Arthur St. Martin, 47, lost his balance, fell to the ground and was fatally injured. He died in the hospital soon afterwards.

### U. S. STEEL REPORT

Earnings for Quarter \$21,892,016, Smallest Since 1915—Chairman's Statement.

New York, July 27.—The U. S. Steel Corporation reported yesterday that its earnings for the quarter ended June 30 were \$21,892,016, the smallest of any quarter since March 1915, just prior to the war boom, when they fell to \$12,457,809. Regular dividends of 13 1/4 per cent on the preferred shares and 11 1/4 per cent on the common were declared, but to meet the requirements of the common dividend, on which only 35 cents was earned, it was necessary to draw from the corporation's huge undivided surplus.

Analysis of the corporation's monthly business shows earnings of \$7,336,635 in April and \$7,931,649 in May and \$6,625,732 in June.

Net income of the corporation for the second quarter amounted to \$13,226,909, against \$28,656,239 in the preceding period. This item would have

He was born in Peterboro, called to the bar in 1875 and practised in Peterboro, of which city he was mayor for two years. He was also president of the Peterboro Law Association. He was appointed to the bench in May, 1909.

### SWIMMER'S FOOT TOUCHES DEAD BODY

Boy Had Been Drowned Unnoticed by Scores About Him.

Montreal, July 27.—While bathing, Thomas Hood, of Verdun, felt a body touching his feet under the water. He told his companions and one of them dived and brought up the body of T.
