Cable from Paris Announces  
Sailing for New York Today.

According to a cablegram received this morning by Very Rev. J. J. Walsh, V. G., administrator of the diocese during the absence of Bishop LeBlanc, His Lordship was to sail today from Paris on the steamship France for New York. It is expected that he will be home in about ten days.

The cablegram was dated today and reads: "Will leave Saturday for New York on steamship France. All well." His Lordship has been on his ad limina visit to Pope Benedict and also to attend the beatification ceremonies in Rome. His return is somewhat earlier than had been expected.

## PRESS VISITORS HERE MONDAY

Plans for Entertainment—  
Citizens Should Extend  
Hearty Welcome.

St. John should get out its flags and be in gala attire on Monday when the city will be honored by a visit of members of the National Editorial Association of the United States and their wives and children. The party numbers about 129, of whom 59 are men and the rest women and children.

They will arrive at the Union Depot by special train at 1.30 p.m. daylight time, and will be taken in special cars from the station to Indian town where they will board the steamer Hampton for a sail on the river. The steamer will leave about 2.30 o'clock and it is planned to take the visitors as far as Public Landing and back, about five hours trip.

On the return to the city, the party will be the guests of the city at dinner in the Knights of Columbus Hall, Coburg street, for which arrangements are being made by the Tourist Association.

At 9 o'clock on Tuesday morning, the visitors will be taken for an auto trip about the city and suburbs and will leave St. John about 11.30 a.m. It was planned to have the party visit the Simms and Corone plants where souvenirs were to be presented to each of the members, but the time at their disposal will not allow this. The souvenirs, however, will be presented at the dinner on Monday evening. The members to visit the Simms plant is a traveling whike in a nicely inscribed leather case. After leaving St. John, the train will go to Fredericton and thence to New-castle, Campbellton, Dalhousie and then into Quebec province.

This change of the reception have expressed the desire that all the citizens display flags during the visit of the American press people.

## SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Annual Business Meeting of  
Charlotte Street Baptist  
Church.

The Annual business meeting of the Charlotte street Baptist church was held on last Tuesday evening and the reports submitted show that the year has been a very prosperous one. The total receipts were \$6,661.29, which included \$2,218 contributed toward the inter-church forward movement. The secretary reported an increase of fifteen in the number of baptisms.

The Women's Missionary Aid Society's report showed that \$300 had been raised in connection with their work which included a special offering of \$128. The success of this society was due largely to the efforts of Miss Clara Fullerton and she was heartily congratulated on her excellent work.

Miss Jessie Hart, president of the Young People's Union, reported a very successful year. This society raised \$50 toward missionary work and pledged itself to \$30 toward the inter-church forward movement, of which one-half was paid.

The Sunday school, under the leadership of D. C. Clark, superintendent, and G. N. Mott, associate superintendent, had an excellent year. There was an average attendance of 164 each Sunday, and the total collections amounted to \$648. One of the most active societies of the church was the Junior Society. The little girls of the Sunday school are members of this society and they did very efficient work during the year. At present this society has a bank account of \$38.

## HOTEL EMPLOYES TAKE STRIKE VOTE

Toronto, June 12.—Strike votes are being taken among the employees of the United Hotel Company in Canada, who are engaged in the culinary trades in the Clifton House, Niagara Falls, Ont., the Royal Connaught Hotel, Hamilton, and the King Edward Hotel, this city, according to officials of the local union of waiters, waitresses and cooks. The question of wages is at issue and union officials said yesterday that if the United Hotel Company made a satisfactory agreement practically all the hotels, restaurants and clubs in Toronto would fall in line.

The result of the strike vote is to be known tomorrow night.

## ONE DAY STRIKE ON STREET RAILWAY-AN ARRANGEMENT MADE

Quebec, June 12.—The Levis county railway resumed service yesterday after a strike of one day. This was the result of a conference by the mayor of Levis, the general manager of the Levis county railway and the representatives of the company's employees. The city of Levis accepted a new schedule of rates suggested by the company in order to allow the latter to pay increased wages to the employees. The new tariff is: Four tickets for 30 cents, instead of four for 25 cents; fifty tickets for \$3.50; ten cents cash. The fares and eight children's tickets instead of ten for a quarter.

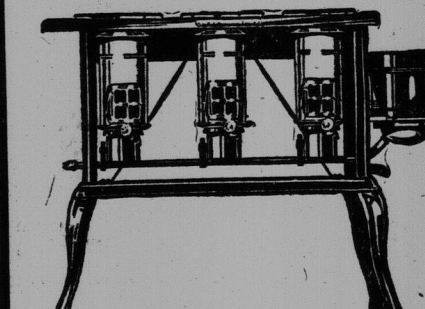
