GAS LEAK CAUSES DEATH
Woodstock, Ont., Nov. 29.—Overcome fumes from a leaking gas pipe, Mrs. Joseph Daniel was found dead in her home in Simcoe street. The lady was eighty-five years of age, and had lived there many years. The death took place some time between Sunday night and at night. The neighbors had not seen her about and their suspicions caused them to enter the house last night, where they found her sitting up on the side of her bed, fully dressed, but quite dead.

She had evidently just been going to retire when she was asphyxiated by the fumes of the gas, which, though not very strong, were sufficiently strong at her advanced age to cause death.

She was born in England, but had spent nearly all her life in Woodstock, where she was well known and highly esteemed. Three sons and three daughters survive.

VERY VALUABLE WORK

The following is an extract from the annual report of the Children's Aid Society of Amherst, which includes all of Cumberland.

The members of the executive have made 150 visits in the interest of this work. Have written more than 100 letters and have done a vast amount of work that cannot be tabulated. We have done a great deal of work, this year along the lines of the truancy problem.

A number of boys and some girls who were habitual truants were brought before us from time to time, with their parents, and if the parents said they were unable to get them to attend school we were made wards of the society, and we succeeded so well that about 75 per cent of them attended our schools regularly. In fact, the late superintendent of the schools gave us credit for accomplishing more in one year along this line than all other agencies combined had accomplished in twenty years. In many cases it was not necessary to make these children wards of the society, just a heart to heart talk with the parents and children being sufficient to accomplish our purpose.

We have also touched some of the home life and have made conditions better for the children there. Thirty children have been made wards of the society during the year, making a total of our wards 130. One of our wards died.

ENGLAND AND PROHIBITION

Montreal, Nov. 29.—The women are splendidly gowned; they smoke and drink wine at dinner with the men; money seems abundant, and nobody haggles about the price; but, concurrently with all this, England is engaged in solving many weighty problems, which, owing to her larger sanity, she will accomplish with more certainty than could be expected from hectic Latin peoples," said James C. Tully, general manager of agencies for the Sun Life Assurance Company, who has returned after a trip to England.

"There is a new England in the making, but there is one thing the average Englishman wants to see as aforesaid: his beer, which temperance people are threatening."

"We are a sober people in the dominion," said Mr. Tully. "We have no idea on this side of how drinking enters into the general life of the people there. They do not want prohibition."

NEW DEADLINE FOR CROOKS.
New York, Nov. 29.—New York's famous "deadline for crooks," established by the police more than a quarter of a century ago, has been moved up-town from Fulton to Fifty-ninth street.

In establishing the original deadline above the financial district, the police warned notorious crooks that their presence within the restricted area would be sufficient cause for their arrest and grilling at headquarters.

The chief reason assigned for shifting the theoretical barrier was the increasing invasion of New York each year, during the holiday seasons, by post-graduate crooks from all parts of the country who ply their art in crowded department stores, hotels and theatres, exacting a heavy toll.

With the shifting of the "dead-line" a special squad was established having jurisdiction over the territory bounded by Fifty-ninth and Twenty-third streets, in which most of the department stores are located.

The "dead-line squad" comprises the pick of New York's detectives.
