## FORTY HOURS A WEEK MINIMUM WAGES

Suggested Canadian Movement-A Word of Caution by Minister

Toronto, Feb. 15—On the ground that it would be the most effective means of solving unemployment situation, special met last night resolved that the dominion government should be requested immediately upon the convening of parliament to enact a law to the effect that the miximum working week should be controlled in the miximum working week should be controlled in the miximum wage of

The resolution was passed in the presence of Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, and he responded by cautioning the trades unions to use moderation, "or he felt that if too strong demands are made upon industry at this time, their demands are apt to return in the form of a bomerang."

"In my opinion," he said, "\$1 a day should be the minimum wage."
