TEED SAYS IT WAS FLEMMING WHO PUT HIM IN CHARGE OF THE TIMBER LIMITS GRAFT FUND

(Continued from page 1).
A.—I don't know but I remember Mr. Berry was there.
Q.—Was anyone else there?
A.—I have no recollection.
Q.—Do you remember what Mr. Flemming said?
A.—No.
Q.—You heard Mr. Brankley swear that Mr. Flemming said "Anything Mr. Teed tells you will be all right?"
A.—Yes but I cannot remember it. That meeting is absolutely vague in my mind.
Q.—Tell what you know.
A.—If can only remember Mr. Berry introducing Mr. Brankley to me somewhere in the Barker House.
Q.—Mr. Teed told us what you remember of the conversation?
A.—It was short, but I understood from that I was to go to Mr. Brankley's town to receive some money for a fund the lumbermen were making up.
Q.—What was the fund?
A.—I think it was the fund for the first knew of it from Flemming.
Q.—The first knowledge of the fund came to you from Mr. Flemming?
A.—Yes, that is the first I knew of it.
Q.—You got \$14,740; what did you do with it?
A.—I brought it to St. John and put it in a safety deposit box in the Royal Bank.

A.—I was the custodian of the fund and I thought I had a right to do what I thought best.
Q.—Was that payment afterwards confirmed by Mr. Flemming?
A.—Possibly, there was no reason why I should not mention it to him.
Q.—To whom did you account for the money?
A.—The only instructions you had were to take charge of the fund?
A.—That is all.
Q.—What other moneys did you get?
A.—\$15,000 from F. C. Beattie, of Station Cutler & Co. I was in Mr. Berry's room and this gentleman came in. I had never seen him before. He said he was a "Barker" and he had a parcel for me. I said "All right, put it on the bureau." He was waiting for something and I offered him a cigar. He asked if he was not to get a receipt and I said: "I will give you a receipt for the parcel you will get to receipt." He said it is valuable and I should have some-
