IRON, STEEL, METAL AND MACHINERY MARKETS

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for the week ended March 5, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following observations:

It is not unlikely that further orders for machinery will be placed with Canadian manufacturers by the American government which, in conjunction with the present year with the result that the expenditure of large sums of money.

Canada is probable this year for it is the intention of the dominion government to build up its steel industry to the point where it can produce the capacity of the ship yards. All this indicates great activity in the steel and metal working industry and production.

The favorable weather and production will show a steady increase during the coming weeks. The change in weather conditions should soon prevail.

There is yet considerable freight congestion on the railways which will not be entirely eliminated for some time owing to the car shortage, but with a continuance of favorable weather, traffic conditions will materially improve and the steel plants benefit accordingly.

Merchants report business as being fair but are hampered by low deliveries and delays in having to obtain permits before material can be shipped.

Business is being done, but it is changed. In the United States conditions in the iron and steel trade are improving and production is increasing. An effort is being made by the prominent steel manufacturers to have prices increased when the schedule comes up for revision. The scrap metal market continues quiet with little business passing.

Consumers are still under the impression that prices will decline. In the non-ferrous metal markets the outstanding feature is a sharp advance in tin due to the great scarcity and unfavorable outlook. The copper market is quiet but it is possible that the price will be raised to meet the cost of increased production costs. Prices of machine shop supplies are holding firm and business continues in good volume. Sold have advanced because of the high cost of tin. Some styles of wrought pipe are higher but the standard lines are unchanged. The machine tool trade is fairly active, the demand being principally for single tools for machine shops and for shipbuilding.

British Drive Them From Posts They'd Won

GERMANS BEATEN WITH HEAVY LOSS

British Drive Them From Posts They'd Won

FIGHTING IS SEVERE

Two Attacks on Haig's Line Learned of in Time to Prevent German Success—A Freak of War—Spring Flowers in Bloom

With the British Army in France and Belgium, Sunday, Mar. 10—(By the Associated Press)—Heavy artillery fire was proceeding at various points along the front today, but there has been no infantry action of importance since yesterday morning when the British, in a violent counter-attack, hurled the Germans from the posts they succeeded in capturing in the region of Polderhoek ridge on Friday evening.

The British defences here and south of the Houtholst Forest, where the Germans also seized six posts on Friday morning, have been re-established completely after severe fighting in which the Germans lost heavily.

Both their attacks were but apologies for what the Germans had planned originally. They had intended to make a pretentious assault on the northern sector south of the Houtholst Forest on Friday, 26, to pinch off the British salient in the region of Polderhoek ridge.

On Thursday the British gunners put down a terrific barrage and the Germans did not attempt to advance. On Friday evening, however, they moved against Houtholst Ridge under a hail of shells that the enemy was forced to abandon his salient.

A strong attack had also been planned for Friday morning, which gained them six posts temporarily. The final result was that they were driven out with severe losses and also forced to abandon some of their own forward positions.

Early on Saturday morning a strong attack had also been planned for Friday, 26, against important high ground held by the British in the region of Polderhoek and southwest of that place. A prisoner taken by the British is said to have divulged that the German plan was to capture the ridge and prevent the carrying out of this programme and later German prisoners said their regiments had been paroled and informed that the attack had been postponed because the British had learned of it. The same prisoners said the attack had been put off until the morning of March 8.

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
