YOUNG MAN IS ARRESTED; GIRL IS SENT HOME

Seduction Charge in Fredericton Case—Fortune Left by Boston Woman

Fredericton, Dec. 9.—An eloping pair from Bloomfield Ridge for whom the city marshal has been searching for several days, were located this morning in Brewster's Hotel, York street. The young man, who gave his name as Harry Stewart, was arrested on a warrant charging seduction, and was lodged in jail. The girl, Maud Fong, daughter of E. C. W. Fong, was taken to the home of relatives. She was married. She said she had been married to Stewart. It is believed that scarcity of funds prevented them from being married.

Open Letter to Dr. O. B. Price, M.P.P.

St. John West, N. B., Dec. 8th, 1912.

Dear Sir,—I wish to remind you that at the public temperance meeting held in Moncton last Friday evening, you made a vain endeavor to refute certain deliveries which were made, and that I suggested that on any other occasion when you would arrange, I would be agreeable to the discussion with you of the whole temperance situation.

Not having heard from you, I now inform you of my intention of being present at the Prohibition Convention in Moncton on Dec. 11th, and if on that date or any other date you make the arrangements, I will be pleased to debate with you the points at issue.

As leading supporters of discussion I would suggest: 1. The dismissal of officials whose performance of duty has displeased the room sellers; 2. The government's refusal to even courteously reply to representations made for a prohibitory law; 3. Its refusal to demand officers who fail to do their duty; 4. Amendments which stipulate the license law; 5. Refusal to strengthen the present license law. There are other issues but these are sufficient to make your task sufficiently heavy.

ARRIVAL OF THE PAPAL DELEGATE

The Montreal train with the papal delegate and other church dignitaries, arrived in the city about half past one o'clock, being one hour and a half late. On their arrival the visitors were met by a large delegation of clergymen and also a large number of the laity. They were escorted to the Bishop's Palace, where Monsignor Stagni and the other robed and proceeded to the cathedral. The church was handsomely decorated for the occasion, the altar being handsomely illuminated, and decorated with red and white, the papal delegate's colors. The decoration was the work of A. C. D. Wilson. The altar boys wore hose of yellow and white. In the sanctuary the presentation of the address took place. Long before their arrival the church was crowded to its doors.

The following address was read by Rev. A. J. O'Neill of Silver Falls:—

Address to the Delegate

The Most Reverend Pergrino Francis Stagni, O. S. M. D. D., Archbishop of Aquila, Apostolic Delegate to Canada and Newfoundland.

May it Please Your Excellency:—

The clergy and laity of the Diocese of Saint John desire to extend to you their heartfelt greetings, and to bid you welcome on this, the occasion of your first visit to this city. At the time of your appointment to this exalted position, you now hold, we were pleased to know the Holy Father showed such a hearty and distinguished ecclesiastical representative in this Dominion. Fully conscious that the interests of the Canadian church are dear to the heart of the Sovereign Pontiff, we cannot express the joy that animates us in the presence of Your Excellency knowing that you are his ambassador, and the special messenger of his love and good will.
