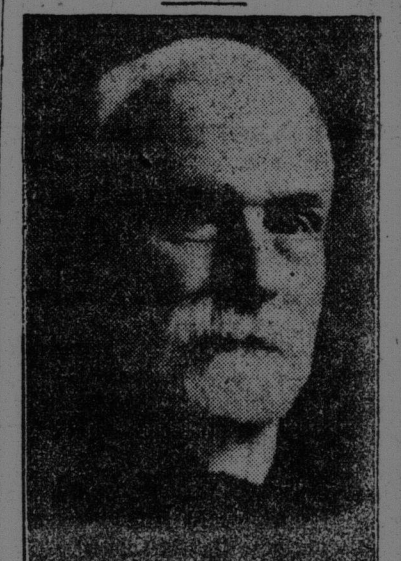

NEW LORD MAYOR IS A DOCTOR

London so Honors The Medical Profession For First Time

PHYSICIANS IN HIGH PLACE

Members of Royal Families Who Are Skilled in Medicine—Doctors Who Have Attained To Eminent Positions—Power Behind Rulers of Nation

For more than 700 years there has been a mayor of London, and in that time it might be supposed that every trade and profession had contributed at least one member to that high office. Yet it was only the other day that the first lord mayor who was a medical doctor was elected. It would appear that England has been a little slow in conferring her honors, on the medical profession, for elsewhere doctors have had a fair share of important offices, and on more than one occasion have risen to the heads of great democracies.

Sir Charles Tupper was a medical man, for instance; two or three presidents of Switzerland have been doctors, and one of the ablest statesmen of France, Premier Clemenceau, is a physician. The latter continued to practice even after having become prime minister of the republic, and it is said that there was often considerable confusion between his official callers and former patients who came for treatment. It is related that on one occasion his servant mistook a dignified prefect for a patient and insisted that he take off his coat and shirt before presenting himself to Dr. Clemenceau, in order that the great specialist's time might not be wasted.

Royal Physicians
It is said that the young Queen of the Belgians could easily pass a medical examination, since she was for many years the chief assistant of her father, Prince Louis Ferdinand of Bavaria, the leading gynecologist and obstetrician of Bavaria, and the president of the Imperial German Cancer Research Fund. Prince Louis confines his practice to the poorest patients, and rarely accepts a fee of any kind.

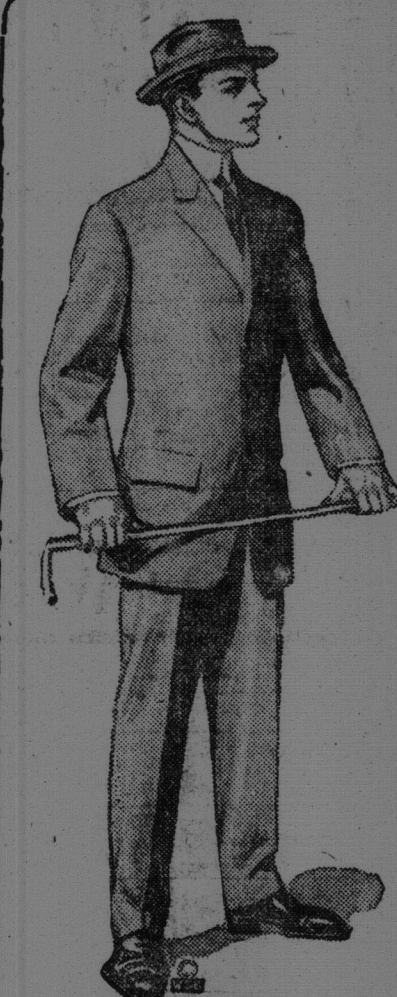
The late Duke Charles Theodore of Bavaria was one of the most famous oculists of Europe, and at the time of his death had to his credit nearly six thousand successful operations for cataract, almost entirely among the poor. The ex-Queen Amelie of Portugal passed a medical examination in order that she might give a more intelligent oversight to the hospitals which she founded at Lisbon.

The Queen of Bulgaria is also a doctor. With these precedents in mind, the London Lancet not long ago recommended that one of the youngest sons, King George should take up the study of medicine, so that the profession should have the honor to which it was entitled. There was very little opposition to the suggestion on the part of the lay press, and since the late King Edward was a lawyer it would seem only fair that a prince of the blood should become a doctor, to maintain the balance between the two professions.

Doctors Who Became Famous
Leaving royalty aside, a long list might be prepared of medical men who have attained high positions outside of their profession. The present Leonard Wood, a medical doctor, and declared by Theodore Roosevelt to be the most valuable servant of the United States.

It was a coincidence that was frequently noted that, while General Wood was chief of the United States army, another doctor, Sir Frederick Bouverie was minister of militia in Canada. Sir Leander Starr Jameson, famous as Dr. "Jim" and more recently prime minister of South Africa, a medical man. Lord Easter, who represents his profession in the House of Lords, is one of the greatest doctors in the world. Dr. Sprague is speaker of the House of Commons, and it would be easy to name a dozen doctors who have served the country in high positions of state.

Power Behind Thrones
According to an "Ex-Attache," doctors are really the power behind the throne in many countries in Europe, since monarchs and their health falls into the hands of every command of the medical man who has charge of the case. The ascendancy of the medical profession in the world, where health has been restored, and it is not unusual for a medical man to be the most trusted adviser of kings and queens. This same authority says that a doctor had far more influence over Queen Victoria than any other person, and that she used to consult him about all sorts of matters not at all connected with her health.

STOP WAR BY ADVERTISING

Once People and Out Waste of It, Armed Strife Would Cease, Says Norman Angell

London, Oct. 24—Norman Angell has explained how he came to write his own famous book, "The World's Optimal Illusion." Mr. Angell is not the usual kind of peace advocate. "I do not desire to see the world a paradise of fat sheep," he says. "I for one, would rather die from a bullet in battle than be choked of fire-damp in a mine." His objection to war is not that it is a struggle, but that it is sheer waste. For six weeks after Mr. Angell's book was published there was not a sign of response, and not even a single newspaper notice. Then it fell in the hands of a leading European statesman, who was so struck by it that he circulated hundreds of copies among kings and his fellow-rulers. Mr. Angell believes that war can be ended to some extent by advertisement. "European opinion could be transformed in a very short time by a legislative act of money. If some philanthropist were to save a quarter of a million in wise publicity just now, an intellectual ferment could be set up, and a spirit of inquiry aroused that would do the work." He explains that he would buy the first page of every daily paper in Germany on the same day in this time of crisis. He would print there a great note of interrogation and a brief message—five hundred words would do—asking what the people would expect to get by war, and showing how even a successful war could not fail

to cost them more than their nation could gain. He would set them questioning. The remainder, he thinks, would follow. "Once the people as a whole are convinced that war between great European Powers is now inevitably ruinous for all who wage it, war will cease."
