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MATTERS OF RELIGION AND OF RACE Senator Poirer's Address Before The French Language Congress IT DIFFERS FROM OTHERS

New Brunswick Speaker's Words Draw Brief But Significant Comments From Archbishop Bruchesi in the Assemblage in Quebec

Quebec, June 27.—A flood of eulogies and optimistic rhetoric, which so far have been the distinguishing feature of the speeches at the Congress du Parler Francais, came out last night a prophet who dared to give the other side of the picture, to point out some of the discouraging features of the situation and faults which cry out for correction in the French-Canadian system of education.

Archbishop Bruchesi, who was the next speaker, made a brief and significant reference to the remarks of Senator Poirer. "Were I asked," he said, "I would give my absolute to the author of the previous speech with a few remarks, certain advice, and a penance."

Senator Poirer declared that there were certain disquieting signs in the horizon. "Our influence in the high councils of parliament," he said, "is not what it used to be. The people of the other races in Canada, interpret it as an attack on their various beliefs, and the consequence is that they become intolerant. It is in Acadia and the west who suffer as a result. An example of this is the establishment of a normal school in New Brunswick today, we do not dare mention it."

BUREAU READY TO RUN ELECTION AGAIN Ottawa, Ont., June 27.—Jacques Bureau of Three Rivers wants to demonstrate the growth of Liberal strength in Quebec since September 21. He proposes to admit judgment against him in the election case and again run in Three Rivers. In the general election he had a majority of three and in a new contest he would have 300.

IMPORTANT WATER WORK Southern Section of City Will Benefit—Why Some Household-ers do Not Get Supply

Renewals of several important water mains are being made and when completed the work will greatly improve the service in the southern section of the city. Work is now being carried on in Mecklenburg street, in Princess between Canterbury and Wentworth and in Sydney street between Princess and Duke. In the first mentioned a four inch main is being replaced by an eight inch pipe and in the others twelve inch pipe is being substituted for the present mains of six inches diameter.

TO DEMONSTRATE THE POSSIBILITY OF AIR INVASION OF ENGLAND German Dirigible Airship Starts on Ten Hour Sea Trip With Twelve Passengers

Hamburg, Germany, June 27.—The Zeppelin dirigible airship Victoria Louise started this morning on a ten hour over-sea trip with twelve passengers. The monster airship flew directly out from this city over the North Sea. It is said in some quarters that the purpose of the trip is to demonstrate a possible air raid on England is possible. The speed of 45 miles an hour gives a radius as wide as London from Hamburg, as far as Bristol from Emden. The Victoria Louise passed over the island of Heligoland at quarter past nine.

After staying in Boston for a few days they left for New York in the new car shipping the old one back by boat.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT TO LEAVE FOR MARITIME PROVINCES ON JULY 23 Montreal, June 27.—It is semi-officially announced that the Duke of Connaught and royal party will leave Quebec on July 23 en route to the maritime provinces. The itinerary has not yet been arranged.

SECOND FIRE IN WEEK IN CATHOLIC CHURCH PROPERTY More Than \$80,000 Loss in Winnipeg—Believed Work of Firebugs

Winnipeg, June 27.—For the second time within a week, the Cathedral of St. Boniface has suffered heavily from fire. Last Saturday night the St. Joseph convent was entirely gutted, and a fire broke out in a new \$200,000 seminary being erected near the cathedral and amounting to \$50,000 had been done.

DICTOGRAPH EVIDENCE IN THE DARROW TRIAL Los Angeles, June 27.—The transcript of the conversations between Clarence S. Darrow, now on trial for bribery in connection with the defense of McNamara brothers and John R. Harrington, as recorded by a telephonic device hidden in a room in a hotel, will likely be offered in evidence by the prosecution before the day's proceedings are completed.

FRENCH SEAMEN'S STRIKE Paris, June 27.—The French government is considerably disturbed over the seamen's strike, which is causing a tremendous loss to French shipping. The strikers have accepted the suggestions of arbitration and the government has made another appeal to the shipowners to follow a similar course but they again declined to do so today, saying that it was impossible to grant higher wages to the men. The Messageries Maritime Company is willing to withdraw from the men.

FIVE OF TWENTY-THREE WILL DIE Seamen Fearfully Injured By Explosion of Gun on French War Vessel

Toulon, France, June 27.—Five of twenty-three seamen injured yesterday on board the French armored cruiser Jules Michelet of Hyeres by the premature explosion of a six inch gun are dying in the Naval Hospital here. The charge ignited and ten more officers and men were injured. The official inquiry into the cause of the accident shows that there were two explosions. By the first thirteen men were hurled to the deck and frightfully burned.

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COLLISION IN ST. CROIX; ONE DROWNED Engineer Carey of American Dredge Goes to His Death

Struck by Steamer Steering Gear of The Grand Maroon Caught on Trip With 300 Excursionists Aboard—Repe is Found Entangled in Her Propeller

St. Stephen, N. B., June 27.—The steamer Grand Maroon, Captain Ingersoll, carried an excursion party of about 300 under the auspices of the Thistle Athletic Association, to St. Andrews last evening, and when returning about twelve o'clock collided with the Bay State Dredging Company's dredge, No. 4, Captain Littlefield, and sank the dredge.

Dynamite Kills Indian Montreal, June 27.—By the explosion of dynamite which was intended for fishing purposes, Pierre Labadie, a Canadian Indian, was instantly killed and five of his fellows of the reservation were or less seriously injured. The boat was blown in pieces, and sank.
