SUMMONS TO LAW NOT EXPLAINED

Foreign Situation Or The Troubles In Ireland

BALMORAL BALL POSTPONED

King in Consultation With Foreign Minister and Leader of Unionists Over Political Matters—Papers Do Not Agree on Guesses

New York, Sept. 28.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: A ball which was to have taken place in Balmoral castle last night was cancelled at the last minute. The reason for the cancellation was understood to be that His Majesty was engaged in consultation with Sir Edward Grey and a Bonar Law in connection with the political situation.

Sir Edward Grey arrived at Balmoral early in the week with Mr. Sarcoff, the Russian ambassador. The leader of the opposition was summoned to Balmoral and arrived there on Thursday night. The ball is the usual one given every year, with the court in residence in the north, to the girls and tenants on the Balmoral estate. It is now expected to be given next week.

MANY BOYS IN JUVENILE COURT

A busy session of the juvenile court was held by Magistrate Ritchie this morning. Some twenty boys were arraigned. The two lads arrested on Thursday for entering Calvin church and doing damage to the property, were given a sound lecture and were allowed to go on a suspended sentence.

LAST DIRECT TRIP

The last direct trip of the Eastern Steamship Company's steamer for the season of 1912, will be made by the Calvin Austin this evening, not yesterday as previously stated. The Austin will leave Reed's Point this evening at seven o'clock. Hereafter boats will leave on Monday, Wednesday and Friday morning for Boston, taking the coastwise route. The Austin and the Governor Cobb will be the only two on the line now. Those who wish to see the last Boston steamer will have to catch her on Monday morning's boat, October 7 and will continue in Boston on Tuesday at noon when she will give the fans a chance to look after the securing of their tickets for the game on Wednesday.

Nervous Feeling Over Calmness At Opening

The Belfast Services

Industrial Works and Shops Closed

In England Aquisition Taken Less Seriously in Last Few Days—Interview With Wm. Redmond in New York

Belfast, Ireland, Sept. 28.—Ulster Day, the Orangemen's anniversary day of protest against home rule, opened with a calmness which rendered Ulster men and women who are nervous as to what might happen. The people of Ireland, even those responsible for today's signature of the formidable "League and Covenant," had looked forward to the day's happenings with a great degree of misgiving.

The weather was doubtful early in the day, but before the Ulster men had begun to gather for the religious services which proceeded the signing of the covenant, sunshine flooded the streets.

SAVE GAME OVERPLAYED
