FARMERS SHOULD KEEP GOOD COWS

INSTRUCTIVE ADDRESS AT THE
MEETING OF PARTONS OF SAL-
FORD CHEESE FACTORY.

From Thursday's Daily.

There was a representative atten-
dance at the annual meeting of the
Salford Cheese Manufacturing Co.,
held in the village hall yesterday af-
ternoon. M. C. Elliott occupied the
chair. The directors of 1912 were re-
elected as follows: Messrs. W. H.
Chambers, John Warren, F. H. Gregg,
W. H. Wilford and Geo. Harris. The
auditors' report showed that the fac-
tory had a successful season during
1912, and prospects are bright for
1913. Addresses were delivered dur-
ing the afternoon by Wm. Danday, W.
J. Elliott, and A. E. Gracey, Dairy
Instructor. Mr. Gracey's address was
interesting and very instructive. He
exhibited 2 small cheese, each made
from 50 pounds of milk of different
quality. The cheese made from 50
pounds of milk containing five per
cent of butter fat and 2.7 caseine
weighed 6 1/2 pounds, while the one
made from 50 pounds of milk contain-
ing three per cent of butter fat and
2.1 caseine, weighed only 4 1/2 pounds,
or a difference of 2 1/2 pounds of cheese
in 50 pounds of milk. The exhibit
forcibly illustrated the advantage of
the dairymen keeping good cows and
will go a long way towards educating
the patrons of cheese factories to fa-
vor paying for milk by the Babcock
test.

ed for season 1.09; number of pat-
rons 46.

HURT AT THAMESFORD.

Warren Tomlinson Attempted to Stop
Runaway Team.

Thamesford, Feb. 25.—While at-
tempting to stop a runaway team this
morning Warren Tomlinson received
serious internal injuries, the extent of
which are not known. One leg is bro-
ken and the other is crushed.
The doctors in attendance are un-
able to state as yet whether he will
recover. The accident happened at
Cawthorpe's mill.

The team was standing at the load-
ing platform when it suddenly became
frightened and started to run. Mr.
Tomlinson jumped to stop them, when
he was jammed between the platform
and the heavy wagon.

HAS LOST TWO MEN.

Explorer Mawson Must Spend Winter
Amid Polar Ice.

SYDNEY, N.S.W., Feb. 26.—Two
members of the Mawson Antarctic ex-
pedition, Lieut. Ninnis, an English-
man, and Dr. Merz, Swiss, have died.
Dr. Mawson and six of his compan-
ions have been left for the winter on
Adelie Land, a barren tract in the
Antarctic, because they were unable
to reach the expedition's ship, Aurora,
before she was compelled to leave.
This news is received here in a
wireless despatch from Adelie Land,
via Macquarie Island to Prof. David,
who was a member of Shackleton's
expedition, which reached within 111
miles of the South Pole in 1909, say-
ing:

"Dr. Douglas Mawson and several
of his men missed the Aurora, which
had gone to fetch them under the
command of Capt. J. K. Davis. This
happened owing to unfortunate cir-
cumstances."

Lieut. B. E. S. Ninnis of the City
of London Regiment of Royal Fus-
iliers, and Dr. Merz, who was ski
champion of Switzerland in 1908, who
were members of the expedition, are
both dead. All the others are well.

"Dr. Douglas Mawson and six other
members of his party probably will
winter on Adelie Land."

"Some very successful sledging ex-
peditions were made during the so-
journ of Dr. Mawson and his compan-
ions in the Antarctic."

Lieut. Ninnis, Governor-General of
the Commonwealth of Australia, has
received a wireless message from Dr.
Mawson, in which he says:

"Our sledging season has been very
successful. We have opened up a
large area of new land both east and
west of Commonwealth Bay. We have
obtained important new data from
numbers of stations in close proximity
to the Magnetic Pole."

"It is probable that six of the staff
of the expedition, as well as myself,
may unavoidably be detained for an-
other year in the Antarctic."

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The British Antarctic Committee
is well satisfied with the present state
of the Scott fund, amounting now to
nearly \$200,000.

Mrs. Bofka of Hamilton who was so
seriously injured last Wednesday in
the row in which Casimir Linkiewicz
was murdered, is recovering.

Three indictments under the Sher-
man law against Chicago packers were
dismissed yesterday, thus clearing the
calendar of all charges against the
packers.

The death roll in the dynamite ex-
plosion at the Doukhorob settlement
at Brilliant, B.C., has been increased
to four. Two others have had their
eyes removed.

Mrs. Emeline Pankhurst was yes-
terday admitted to bail in the sum
of \$2,800, on giving an undertaking to
refrain from incitement while her trial
is progressing.

John Beal Sneed, a wealthy west
Texas ranch owner, was yesterday
declared not guilty of the murder of
Al. Boyce, jr., at Amarillo, Texas,
last September.

to Ottawa to present a petition to
