

But this last time, as Baron Lazzaroni, a rich banker, and Mgr. Folchi (with the supposed support of the Vatican) were the promoters of the old idea, it was believed that success was assured. Now, however, the fall of Mgr. Folchi has put everything in peril.

The Pope, it should be added, has never entered into, and never will enter into, a combination of this sort.

The money Mgr. Folchi sent to Paris was withdrawn when his speculation became known. As Mgr. Folchi had placed the Peter's pence money, or a part of it, in Roman speculations, which had at first brought in good returns, and which only lately decreased in value, the actual losses have not been great, In fact, at first a profit of about 1,500,000 lire was made.


