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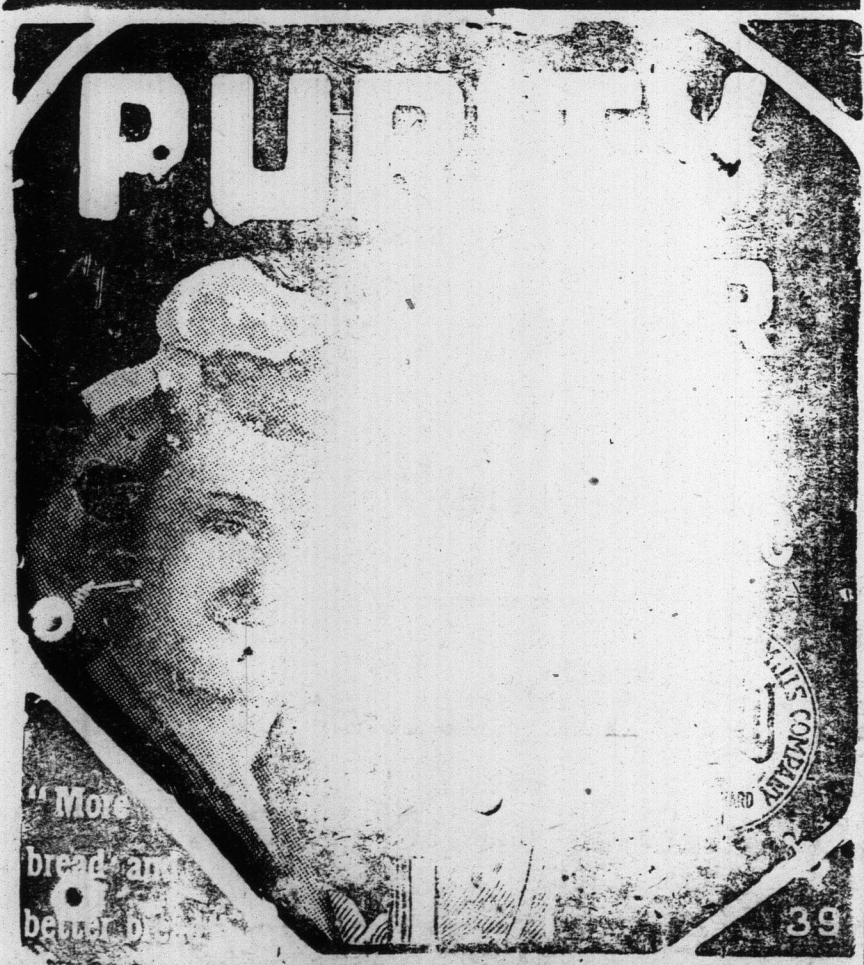

WAR NEWS

Notable Words
Paris, Aug. 6.—At French headquarters, Joffre, in an interview with an Associated Press correspondent, says that the turning point in the war is now reached, and that the Germans' collapse is now a certainty.

Russian Captures
Petrograd, Aug. 6.—Russian attacks along the Sereth and Graberka Rivers, south of Brody, in Northern Galicia, have broken the Teutonic resistance and resulted in the capture by the Russians of six villages and the entire ridge along which they are located, according to a War Office announcement today. More than 3,000 prisoners were taken.

Mine Sweeper Sunk
London, Aug. 7.—The Admiralty announced today that the British mine sweeper Clacton was torpedoed and sunk in the Levant on August 3rd. Five members of the crew are missing and five wounded.

A Generous Gift
London, Aug. 7.—Premier Morris, of Newfoundland, received a cheque for a thousand pounds from Lord Rothmere, Chairman of the Anglo-Nfld. Dev. Co., for war contingent comforts.

Admirable Work
London, Aug. 7.—A description of how the Turks were drawn into a trap at Romani by the British cavalry is given in a Cairo despatch. The despatch says the cavalry was sent out to entice the enemy, who had shown a disposition to assume the offensive. British horse men fought an admirable rear guard action, says the despatch, drawing the Turks until their flank was turned by a mounted division. A whole brigade was compelled to surrender. Among the prisoners were 70 Germans, including 36 officers. A complete battery of German guns was also taken.

British Official
London, Aug. 7.—Australian, Kent, Surrey and Sussex troops, during the week, advanced west and north of Pozieres on a 3,000 yards front, capturing the enemy's main second line system, and several hundred prisoners. In Verdun sector the French captured and held Thiaumont wood and the greater part of the village of Fleury. Many counter attacks here and in the Somme region were repulsed with heavy losses.

Turks, estimated at 14,000 strong, attacked our positions near the Suez Canal, and were defeated with very heavy loss. They were pursued 18 miles. Over 3,100 unwounded prisoners were captured. The General highly commends the conduct of the Australian, New Zealand and Territorial troops.

South of Brody the Russians have occupied the right bank of the Sereth River, capturing over 6,500 prisoners and numerous machine guns. Heavy fighting continues on the River Stokhod.

In Asia Minor the Russian advance continues. General Sauts reports further progress.

BONAR LAW.
The Worst is Yet to Come
"Hell let loose," says Von wearts, the organ of German socialism in describing the food riots in Berlin. It may be exaggeration. Even if true, however, it is nothing compared with what is going to "break loose" when the still deluded German people come to fully realize the extent of the crime committed against them by Prussian Junkerism.—New York Herald.

SERVICE.**

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.
A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 55 cents to \$1.00.
A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.
To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.
Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass with the radio of the wireless station Cape Race and Cape Ray.
Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.
