MONEY IN CHEESE.

In 1883 Untario made \$5,589,000 worth of cheese. This year the value of the product exceeds \$15,000,000. How much of this fifteen millions will come to Kent, the best pastoral county in Canada? Very little? We have within our borders only two or three factories, whereas we ought to have two or three dozen. Middlesex, Oxford, Perth and Elgin, without half our advantages in that line, each make more cheese in one summer than Kent does in twenty years. And the greater part of the cheese product of the above named counties is sent to England, sold at good prices, paid for in good gold, and the money returned to the factory patrons who supplied the milk.

Why cannot this county imitate the others mentioned in this industry? Why do not the farmers of the various sections get together, agree to supply so much milk each, engage competent cheese-makers and dot the county with factories from end to end? There would be millions in it.

We believe that the distinguished municipal statesman who mixed up the tariff said something to that effect as an excuse for his folly. But the farmer's business is to grow

grain to sell, either as grain, or as beef, pork, mutton or fowl. Free corn cheapens the native corn of the Ontario corn belt, and damages the farmoats, peas and barley, and damages the farmers who grow them. The purchasing of cheap American corn and converting it into beef or pork is not farming. That sort of "farming" would in a few years lay waste every farm in Canada. Cheap corn favors the man who grows hogs in large numbers or purchases young hogs in large numbers, and feeds them for the market. He doesn't farm. He never uses a plow or a reaper. He produces no grain, no fruit, no dairy products. He is simply a manufacturer of pork. And he not only injures the bona, fide farmer by importing free corn to cheapen the price of the latter's product, but he ruins the market for the bona fide farmer's pork by manufacturing an inferior article,

RUSSIA'S RULER'S RICHES.

Bothschild Among European Sovereign In the Cuar.

The Emperor Paul, whose reign was was nevertheless one of the most brilliant, was nevertheless one of the greatest benefactors of the dynasty. He not only settled the order of succession on a permanent basis, but also endowed his posterity with the material means of maintaining their position. It is claimed that no other programs family in Farence is a real program of the control of their position. It is claimed that no other reigning family in Europe is so well pro-vided for Paul I set aside a vast amount of landed property, under the name of the imperial appanages, for the sole benefit of all grand dukes and grand duchesses not in the direct line of succession, while the in the direct line of succession, while the sovereign and the heir apparent, together with their respective families, were to be supported out of the funds of the state.

These appanages of the Russian imperial family now cover the enormous total area in different sections of Russia of 21, 200 000 acres, an extent of land larger by

000,000 acres, an extent of land larger by

2,000,000 acres than the whole of Scot-land. This total includes 15,000,000 acres of wood and forest, producing yearly more than 5,000,000 rubles. The total annua revenue of the imperial appanages now reaches 20,000,000 rubles or more than £2,000,000, and, with no fewer than 46 members of the imperial family to support, the expenditure at present amounts to a yearly average of over 5,000,000 ru-bles. In 1891 it was over 6,000,000 rubles. The appanages are quite separate and distinct from extensive private property, and from the crown or state domains, administered by the minister of agriculture, and they do not contribute toward the annual expenditure of the imperial court, amounting, as far as can be ascertained, to about £1,000,000, nor toward providing dowries for imperial grand duchesses. Before the emancipation of the serfs the appanages possessed over 800,000 peasants, who paid annually in land and poll taxes for the benefit of the imperial family nearly 3,000,000 rubles and during 68 years, up to their liberation, altogether 119,000,000 rubles, or £12,500,000. The department of imperial appropriate the street of ment of imperial appanages has since be-come the largest landed proprietor, the largest agriculturist and the largest wine largest agriculturist and the largest with producer in the empire. Its industrial en: terprises in timber, sugar, cotton and other products are rapidly developing on a proportionately large scale. During a century of existence it has furnished the collateral branches of the imperial house and the collateral branches are colleted. with altogether 236,000,000 rubles, and

as the imperial progeny continues to in-crease a large reserve fund is employed in preparing to meet their ever growing de-mands.—London Times. While the introduction of portable fire-arms into Europe is of comparatively re-cent date, their use was frequent among the Mohammedans of eastern Asia at a very early period. firing of small arquebuses at the great festivals in Damascus.

The first use of muskets in Europe was at the slege of Rhege in 1591 by the Spanish soldiers. These arms were so extremely heavy that they could not be used with out a rest. They were provided with matchlocks, and were effective at a considerable distance. While on the march the soldiers themselves carried only the am-

munition and the rests, and boys, bearing the muskets, followed after, like caddles on a golf course. Loading these cumbersome arms was alow operation. They were clumsy and awkward to handle, the ball and powder were carried separately, and the preparation and adjustment of the match took a

The guns became lighter in construction, and the soldiers carried their ammunition in broad shoulder belts called bandeliers, to which were suspended a number of little leather covered wooder cases, each of which held a charge of powder.
