

DOG SHOW WAS GREAT SUCCESS

QUALITY OF EXHIBITS
BETTER THAN USUAL

Meat of All Coast Spring Circuit
Met at Duncan for Final Honors

While the entries in the Cowichan dog show, which was held at Duncan on Saturday, were not quite as numerous as last year the exhibits, with the exception of a few of the local dogs, were the cream of all the coast shows. There were a number of the best dogs on the continent shown there and Victoria was especially well represented.

The Cowichan dogs, it may be noted, are steadily improving. The clumber and springer spaniels shown by Messrs. Bevan and Elkington were deserving of special commendation. These dogs will in all probability be heard from at the larger shows in the future. The Jesmond kennels of Victoria as usual took everything in sight in the cocker class.

English setters were well represented, the famous Mallwyd strain still carrying off most of the prizes. Since T. P. McConnell imported Mallwyd Bob from the Old Country this strain of dog has taken the principal prizes on this coast, and even old Bob himself is not entirely out of the running yet. He was not present yesterday, however, but Mallwyd Major and Mallwyd Swallow took his place.

There were four very fine bull dogs from New York which, unfortunately, were unopposed. This exhibit was generally admired and will be the means of interesting local fanciers in the famous old breed which is said to be typical of the British nation.

The various breeds of fox terriers were well represented. Wire-haired dogs were represented by the Trewanta kennels. Champion Swanses Ormonde Bristles, a Victoria-owned dog and the winner of over one hundred prizes, took first prize in the open classes. Scotch terriers shown by Mrs. McLaren of this city were much admired.

Collies were a grand class, though the tendency to the Borzoi type of face is becoming more pronounced in the show ring year by year. The winning dog was certainly a grand one, although handicapped by a noticeable cow-hocked leg, many on this account preferring the second dog, an up-standing black and white with the real collie face and a little room for brawn.

The popularity of the Airedale terriers during recent years was well illustrated at this show, there being a large number of entries and some very fine dogs. One of a few years ago on the coast circuit the Airedales were not represented at all, but now it is always one of the best-filled classes.

Speaking of the show, Mr. Coats, the judge of the terrier classes, said that the quality of dogs found at this show was equal to that on any of the shows on the coast. This was because the cream of all the spring circuit had met together in this little country town. There were 121 dogs in the show and of these, 59 were terriers. The judging of the terriers was very difficult owing to the close competition. He was of opinion that the Cowichan people should be well pleased at the success of the show and at the opportunity given them of seeing some of the finest dogs on the continent.

There was general discontent at the action of the E. & N. Railway in not giving exhibitors any rebate on the regular rate for carrying dogs. The regular rate of \$2.45 for each dog was charged, whereas in former years there had been given a special rate.

The arrangements were all well carried out by the officials. J. S. Hickford, of this city, undertook the management of this branch of the exhibition, and he was ably assisted by the local officials. The show was conducted under Kennel Club rules, and the second show is a good indication that the annual spring event is likely to become one of the established institutions of the place. The Victoria Terrier Club gave several special prizes, which were much appreciated.

INSURANCE COMMISSION CONCLUDES HEARING

Chairman Lennie Says Report Will Probably Be Ready in Two Months

After hearing the argument of E. V. Bodwell, K. C., in favor of the proposed insurance act the insurance commission concluded its hearings on Saturday afternoon. Chairman Lennie thanked J. J. Shalcross and Mr. Bodwell for the information which they had given the commission on the subject of the enquiry, and announced that the commissioners would require about two months to prepare a report from the voluminous evidence taken.

Mr. Bodwell occupied less than two hours with his arguments. He took up the clauses of the draft act and spoke in favor of their enactment. Four main provisions were contained in the draft. First, there was that making compulsory for companies to place a deposit of \$30,000 with the government. This, he contended, would be a safeguard against heavy loss in case a company failed or could not pay its indebtedness. The finance minister, in the case of a conflagration, distribute the money to those in need of immediate relief. The clause was a further safeguard inasmuch as it would prevent companies which were not financially strong from operating in the province. At present there was absolutely no protection.

The second main feature was the clause relating to the inspection of companies by the government. Whenever suspicious circumstances surrounded a company's operations the government would be able to investigate its business. In the case of a good concern the inspection would do no harm, while in the case of a dishonest company the dishonesty would be detected and the license of the concern cancelled. Statistics of fire losses showed an appalling waste. There were suspicious circumstances, Mr. Bodwell claimed, connected with 45 per cent of the fire.

The other clauses he would refer to were those concerning government enquiries into fires and the appointment of a government fire marshal. He thought that a government investigation of any conflagration would have a good moral effect. The idea of appointing a fire marshal as an adjutant was a good one, in evidence before the commission several witnesses had expressed the opinion that the system of fire inspection carried on in the province was effete and comparatively unprofitable with that in vogue across the line. This was not so, in his opinion. The board of underwriters kept up a rigid and thorough inspection and had the knowledge and every device for minimizing fire in their possession. Every one had spoken well of the board.

The chairman remarked that, while the good work of the board was conceded, the witnesses had said that it existed for the purpose of controlling and raising premium rates.

In reply Mr. Bodwell said that the rates were based on a scientific principle. It was not a matter of a uniform rate based on one experience. Rates must be based on the experience of fire insurance companies all over the continent. Underwriting returns were the only figures on which rates could be scientifically founded. At present there were no large profits in underwriting risks. Mr. Bodwell claimed that the attack on the existing rates by witnesses had failed. There was no evidence to show that they were unduly high.

It had been stated before the commission that the act of a government inspection, would hurt the small fire insurance companies. He did not see the necessity for small companies; there was as little excuse for their existence as there was for the existence of a weak bank. They seldom had sufficient capital to cover the risks they took and should be legislated out of existence. The premium tax had been called an income tax, but in his opinion, it was nothing of the kind. It was a tax on the insurance business, and while he did not agree with taxing insurance companies, he thought that if they were taxed, the tax should be a uniform one.

The chairman remarked that the bill appeared to provide for the taxation of outside companies.

Mr. Bodwell replied that this was not the case. The tax was not confined to any kind of company. It was simply a tax on the business and all companies would have to pay it.

ADVERTISING ROYAL CITY.
New Westminster, June 17.—In the event of the advertising committee of the city council and board of trade failing in line it is probable that one of the first steps to be taken to advertise this city and district will be by arranging an exhibit from this district for the Great Northern special advertising car. The car is operated at the expense of the G. N. R. and is taken throughout various parts of the United States and Canada. An attractive exhibit of the products of the district would, in the opinion of Publicity Commissioner Wade, be an excellent advertisement of the district and he anticipates little difficulty in collecting an exhibit that would be the equal, if not the superior, of any that Washington State could produce.

TUG OF WAR WITH BIG CINNAMON BEAR

Prospector Tells of Exciting Experience in Which One Man Was Slightly Injured

Kamloops, June 17.—James Sinclair of Ducks Range, who is interested with Joe Blair and others in copper claims at the head of Seymour Arm, writes an interesting account of their last trip into the country where the claims are located. They went in with their outfit on May 17th, taking a launch from Shuswap. They struck into a terrific storm just as they reached Celeste creek, and for some time thought they would never reach shore. This was the storm which broke up a boom containing 7,000,000 feet of logs and kept all the steamers on the Thompson and Shuswap lake busy for some days gathering the scattered timber.

On their way into the claims from the head of the Arm they saw a great many signs of game, and on the second day ran across a big bunch of caribou with a grizzly bear following them up. The caribou swam across the river and kept along the mountain side with the bear still trailing them up. That the bear was inquisitive as well as numerous was shown very plainly by the incident which befell the party a few days after they had settled down to work at the claims. The three men were all sleeping peacefully when Blair was awakened by some noise in the tent. He opened his eyes to see a big cinnamon bear standing over him. He naturally let out a yell which startled the bear, which in jumping back caught Sinclair by the arm and pulled while Blair caught his feet to pull the other way. Frank Munger, the other occupant of the tent, while this tug-of-war

was in progress, got out his rifle and shot the furry contestant in the unique struggle, thus releasing Sinclair, who escaped with the loss of a shirt-sleeve and some minor lacerations. The blanket in which he was wrapped when the bear seized his arm doubtless saved him from serious injury.

AWARDED DAMAGES.
Action of Mrs. Livingstone Against the B. C. Electric Railway Company.

Vancouver, June 17.—Three thousand dollars was claimed by Mrs. E. B. Livingstone, and the jury awarded her \$1,000 for injuries received from a fall while stepping aboard a street car at the corner of Westminster and Seventh avenues on June 30th of last year.

Mrs. Livingstone stated that as she was stepping aboard the car it suddenly moved on, throwing her on the pavement with a violence that caused injuries, as the result of which she was laid up for five weeks, and that her nerves had not yet wholly recovered from the shock.

The company contended that she tried to board the car after it had started to move.

Mr. Justice Murphy, in summing up, warned the jury that there seemed to be a tendency with some juries to award larger damages against corporations than in a case between two individuals, but there should be no discrimination.

GRAND FORKS ASSESSMENT.
Grand Forks, June 17.—The annual meeting of the court of revision was held in the council chambers. Only seven complaints were made against the assessment roll, which, after a few unimportant alterations had been made, was confirmed. The assessed valuation of lands and improvements within the city limits is \$1,108,880, an increase of \$40,000 over last year.

WILL RE-SURVEY NEW WESTMINSTER

Present Errors Can Only Be Rectified by Comprehensive Survey of Whole City

New Westminster, June 17.—Mayor Lee and Alderman Jardine have returned from a trip to Victoria, whither they went to see about a new survey for the city. They talked the matter over with the surveyor general and other officials of the government, and it is probable that an order will be issued authorizing the city to take steps to have the new survey made at once.

It is expected that the new survey will do away with all trouble with the street lines. Through some errors made by the original surveys the owners of property in the city have never been able to be quite certain how much they owned. In some sections of the city there is a discrepancy of several feet between the line in use at present and the one supposed to be correct.

When the survey is made it will probably be necessary for the city to expropriate some portions of lots found to be in reality on the street, but whether the property owners can be compelled to buy parts of the street found to be on their lots is a different matter. The work will be proceeded with as soon as the order granting the permission is received from Victoria.
