President Castro Has Succeeded in Joining Army Commanded by Gen. Garido.

Willemstad, Island of Curacoa, Sept. 20.—
President Castro of Venezuela, who arrived at Valencia, capital of the state of Carabobo, on Thursday night with 3,660 men, joined forces with Gen. Garido, who has 2,500 men, and left yesterday morning for Tocuyito at the head of a well equipped force with 12 guns to attack the revolutionary army commanded by Gen. Mendos. It is thought probable that Mendoz will retreat to Pao, as he is not strong enough to engage President Castro's forces, and lacks ammunition. lacks amunition.

The junction of the two armies of the government of Venezuela has changed the situation, and it is now believed it will be difficult to overthrow President Castro.

Herds of Wild Animals on Queen Charlott Islands Will Be Captured, Steamer Nell, the Northern freight packet

Steamer Nell, the Northern freight packet, came in this morning frem Northern British Columbis ports with a big cargo. Included among this were about 200 cases and kits of dog-fish oil and over 2,000 cases of salmon from the canneries on the Skeena.

The steamer has an interesting mission before her, namely that of transferring a band of wild cattle from Masset to Essington. The stock belonged to the late Mr. Alexander, the customs officer at Port Simpson, and have been running wild for a number of years. They have heen roaming about on the pasture lands surrounding Masset, and are said to be in excellent condition for marketing. They are extremely wild, however, and have to be approached with a good deal of caution, as on more than one occasion men have taken to trees to avoid a mad encounter with them. It is stated that there are in all over three hundred head, one hundred and eighty having been counted in one band. It is now proposed to shoot the larger of the animals and corral others, taking all to Essington.
