

and responsibility and the expense of the erection of the bridge, at that point Mr. Peters testified that it did not in some cases allow him any at all. He stated that in respect to the Lefebvre bridge, he had stood to lose from \$1,000 to \$2,000 of the erection of the Kingston bridge, as he was now gone. Mr. Peters said that he had made a contribution out of the erection of the Campbell Lefebvre bridge. But let us question Mr. Roy mid upon this question. He or anyone else had not contributed per hundred pounds to erect the bridge, and on cross-examination admitted that to erect the Lefebvre bridge, which was a small bridge, would be worth double as much as Sussex bridge. That would be per hundred pounds, or 14 cents per pound, which is the price that Mr. Peters received for the erection, and everything else connected with it of the work. (Applause). Mr. Peters stated in his evidence that the cost of construction was \$1,000 per
