TORONTO, Jan. 20.—A special cable from Londom to the Evening Tele-gram says: The Times, commenting on the letter of a correspondent deal-ing with the position, of Newfoundland, says: Every Englishman who cares for the weifare and solidarity of the empire must regret the misunderstand-ing existing between the admiralty at London and the colony concerning the naval reserve which the latter de-sires, but it is idle to deny that a very large question is involved, that of col-onial contributions to imperial de-fence.
