JUDGE STEVENS DIED THIS MORNING

Aged Charlotte County Jurist Gone to the Highest Tribunal.

His Career an Active One—He was a Leader in Different Lines of Progress—A Sketch of His Life.

ST. STEPHEN, Oct. 16.—Judge Stevens, who for many years presided over the county courts of this circuit, passed away at ten o'clock this forenoon, after a lengthy illness. He had been in failing health for some years.

His Honor James Grey Stevens was a son of the late Andrew Stevens of Edinburgh, and a grandson of Sir Colin Campbell of Argyle. He was born in Edinburgh on Feb. 24th, 1825, and completed his literary education at the university in that city.

He came to New Brunswick in 1840 he was called to the bar in 1841 and practiced his profession in Charlotte county. He sat for Charlotte in the local assembly from 1842 to 1848.

LACK OF INTEREST SHOWN IN SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

STOLE MR. BARNES' GRIP; WAS SENT UP FOR TRIAL
Montreal Stranger Walked off With St. John Man's Property—Londerry Writer Asks About the Cherryfield Skeleton.

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 16.—Charles Lacey, who gives Montreal as his place of residence, was committed for trial in the police court this morning charged with stealing a dress suit case belonging to Joseph P. Barnes, commission merchant of St. John, who carried it here on No. 134 train last night. Mr. Barnes left his valise and overcoat in the first-class car while he went into the depot to purchase a ticket for Shediac. When he returned both were missing.

Subsequent events proved that the I. C. R. police took the coat at Cherryfield two weeks ago. Mr. Lacey was arrested at the police station about an hour later by Chief Chappell. When Lacey was arrested this morning charged by the C. P. R. for eight years Judge Stevens was secretary of the board of agriculture, and for thirty years president of the promotion of education, holding for many years responsible positions on the board of school trustees. Judge Stevens was a staunch Presbyterian and in 1885 a delegate to the Montreal convention which brought about the union of the church in Canada. He was moderator of the St. John presbytery in 1897 and was a regular attendant at the sessions held here until a few years ago. Judge Stevens decided to retire from the county court bench some four years ago and was succeeded in the Charlotte, Carleton, Victoria-Madawaska circuit by John L. Carleton.

Judge Stevens has prepared and edited a number of publications which have been of value to members of the legal profession. He married in 1845 Miss Elizabeth H. Marks, daughter of John Marks.

RUSSIA.
ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 16.—After investigating the killing of Mile. Semenov, the young medical student confined in the central prison of St. Petersburg, who was shot dead by a sentry September 13, the committee herself at the window of her cell overlooking the courtyard, the commander of St. Petersburg has thanked the soldier who killed the girl and has given him a reward of five dollars. In addition the soldier is upheld in the order of the day as an example to his comrades of the faithful performance of duty. The prisoners claimed that the sentry fired without any warning of provocation, while the sentry said he ordered Mile. Semenov four times to leave the cell, where she and some of her companions were taunting members of the Semenov regiment with the part they had taken in the suppression of the revolt at Moscow which resulted in the assassination of General Min, who was formerly colonel of the regiment.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 16.—The authorities threaten to close the universities of St. Petersburg and Kiev as well as the university of the Moscow because of the holding of revolutionary meetings within the buildings and the participation of non-students in the meetings.

According to a despatch from Tatta, Crimea, a member of the secret police has been arrested there for firing on a dragon patrol with the intention of provoking riotous excesses on the part of the rebellious Jews.

VORONEZ, Russia, Oct. 16.—The police here today seized 12 bombs which were found in the possession of a peasant belonging to the village of Passai, the centre of the agrarian disorders in this vicinity last summer.

AN Interesting Address Before the St. John Presbytery This Forenoon—Message of Condolence Sent to the Family of Judge Stevens.

The quarterly meeting of the St. John presbytery was held in St. Andrew's church this morning with Rev. Frank Baird of Sussex as moderator. After the opening exercises had been carried out the clerk, Rev. A. H. Foster, read the minutes of the last meeting. It was announced that Judge Stevens of St. Stephen was very seriously ill, and the presbytery decided to wire a message of sympathy. The following was prepared:

"The presbytery of St. John, hearing of the serious illness of Judge Stevens, and realizing the very great service he has rendered in the courts of the church, desires to express its sympathy with him and his family in his sickness, and prays that the Great Head of the church may sustain him in this trying hour."

Shortly after the message had been sent to the telegraph office word was received that Judge Stevens had passed away. Another message of condolence was sent to the family. It was moved that a delegation be appointed to attend the funeral. The delegates will be appointed this afternoon.

Rev. J. H. A. Anderson reported that the summer school of missions had been a grand success. J. C. Robertson, general secretary of the Sabbath schools of the Presbytery church in Canada, was called upon and gave a most interesting address. He said that during the year he had visited nearly half of the presbyteries of Canada. The Sunday school attendance of the Presbytery church is not as large as it should be. There are two leakages in the Sunday school. The first is that the churches do not look after the children as well as they might.

There are a number of children who attend Sunday school, but are never asked to join the church. When a scholar becomes of age, he leaves the Sunday school, and is very seldom asked to become a member of the church. When the enrollment is compared with the census, and with the attendance of other denominations, it will be found that the Sunday school attendance has been falling off from the Presbytery church for the past five years. In Ontario the attendance has been decreasing at the rate of 1,000 a year.

The Methodist Sabbath schools are rapidly growing, an increase of 1,000 having taken place during the past five years. In Toronto the Presbyterian Sunday schools have not increased in attendance. Children who are not Sunday school scholars in most cases do not receive much spiritual training at home.

Drs. Fotheringham and Macrae spoke in appreciation of Mr. Robertson's address. Both clergymen knew the facts stated to be true when applied to this city.

A vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Robertson. Shortly after Mr. Robertson had finished his address two clergymen were about to leave the meeting. Judge Forbes arose and informed them that they had committed contempt of court. The two ministers asked permission to leave which was granted.
