It was stated last week by a Winnipeg grain dealer that a project is nearing consummation to establish a grain clearing house at Fort William and Port Arthur, which will have a fareaching effect in obviating many of the difficulties which at present exist in connection with the shipment of grain. The matter has been under discussion for the past year and a half, and it is hoped to have it in operation this fall. At the present time if a company has 20,000 bushels of wheat stored in each of five different elevators and wishes to ship 100,000 bushels, it is necessary for the boat which is to transport the grain to call at each of the five elevators and receive 20,000 bushels. This necessitates long waits while in loading, as all other boats have to do the same thing. Through a grain clearing house it would only be necessary for the boat to call at one of these elevators to receive the whole

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 26—A despatch from Acapulco says that the Government warship General Guerreng has left there to investigate the fate of Clipperton Island, which is reported to have partly disappeared as a result of the recent earthquake shocks. The island is claimed by both France and Mexico, and the question of possession is in process of arbitration between the two Governments. The island was inhabited by the Governor, Ramon Arnaud, and family, a company of soldiers, with the officers and employes of a guano shipping company. The island is surrounded with reefs, and it can only be approached in fair weather in lighters. The people on the island possess no means of communication other than the occasional visit of the ships which convey the guano produced on the island. 
