PROGRESS OF THE CAMPAIGN.

The attendance at Centenary was about as usual last night, the singing by the choir was hearty and probably better expression as more familiarly as had with the tunes and hymns. Mr. Nafziger with great effect sang several solos. Rev. Mr. Sykes in his address continued the line of thought from the previous meeting and in a powerful address with great strength and beauty of the character of Jesus, bearing his remarks upon a clause in Luke 15, 2, "This man receiveth sinners." The speaker earnestly and eloquently referred to the friendship of Jesus, to His mediatorial relation and His loving and faithful care as the Shepherd of those who come to Him. The statement of the text showed that the scribes murmured at the manner in which penitents were received. As it was true in the days of His flesh so it is now true and a faithful saying that Christ Jesus receiveth sinners. He appealed to his hearers to testify by the uplifted hand as to whether or not in their personal experience they could speak of the truth of his assertion. In response practically all hands were raised. He commended Jesus to those who had not by close contact entered into personal fellowship with the Redeemer to God to seek a deeper work of grace. At the after service there was a good attendance.

Mr. Sykes in a thoughtful and earnest way appeals to the judgment of his hearers and to the voice of their emotional response. His addresses are very helpful to those who are at all serious minded and the services are felt to be of great value.

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH.
St. Andrew's church was again filled to its utmost capacity with an interested congregation. Chas. F. Allen sang as solo. Dr. Gray preached with power from the text Hebrews 1:2 on the subject "The Voice which Call to Repentance."

First. "The voice of self interest, to thine own self be true. The best interest that a man can make in life is to give his life to Christ. Many of the wise men of the world, as Tennyson has said, have been Christians. There is an obligation resting on every man to make the best of his life and one cannot make the best of it unless in the service of Christ. He does not force himself into any life, but makes His appeal to the intellect, the heart and the emotions. He says that character is what a man is in the dark, and there is only one material for character, and that is righteousness. Christ comes to wipe out a man's sins and give to him the possibility of a new start on a new beginning."

Second. "Voice of gratitude. Every man should be grateful for the sacrifice that Christ has made for him. The daughter is grateful to the mother whose hand is scarce in saving her from the snare of the devil. Literature testifies to the power of conscience to lead us back to duty and God. A doctor who got \$300 on false pretenses from a town council was tortured by an awakened conscience, and he made restitution. The voice of conscience sounding in the soul often brings a man to God."

Fourth. "Voice of love." We sacrifice easily for the one we love. The young lady leaving her home of wealth for distant China with the man she loves. So love for Christ is a voice calling us unto His service.

Fifth. "The voice of suffering." The pain of the cross brought the thief to his senses, and he there found salvation. So God frequently uses suffering to bring us to His feet. In conclusion he told a touching incident of how an infidel druggist had opposed the evangelist and his work. While the meetings were in progress his daughter suddenly died. The infidel was compelled to call the evangelist to take the funeral service. After the funeral service the broken hearted father was led to Christ. When the evangelist told how the Saviour had forgiven the thief who had crucified him, he was overcome.

At the close of the service a number signified their intention of beginning a Christian life.

BRUSSELS STREET.
If the people of the Brussels street group had any idea that the Rev. W. A. Cameron did not intend to make a straight personal appeal to men, that idea was removed last night. The subject of the address was "The Power of Discipline." From beginning to end it was a loud and convincing setting-forth of the fact that the disciples of Jesus must be the followers of Jesus. Thoughtful men allow themselves to become confused about the meaning of discipline. It has nothing to do with elaboration of creed, of cult. It is a life lived in obedience

to a spirit. Jesus did not need to take up His cross, but He deliberately determined to do so. It is in the beginning. Is a man living without prayer? Living only for this world. Then he is perishing.

When he came to himself he said, "I will." First step is the conversion of the soul. Some say I wish I were a better man, but stops at that, never turns, wishing into willing. Never says I will. What next?

I will arise and go to my Father. Mark that word Father. It was the unconscious expression of his faith. Not the acceptance of a certain set of facts, but confidence in a certain Person. I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him. Come unto Me all ye that are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest.

The next step is the homecoming and the acknowledgment, "I have sinned." And while he was a great way off the Father saw him and ran to meet him. Long before we reach the goal God sees you coming. Pardon full and free.

IN FAIRVILLE.
In Fairville, Evangelist Greenwood spoke on the "Four beholds of the Gospel." The first one was the cry of John the Baptist as he pointed to Jesus walking near the Jordan, "Behold the Lamb of God who taketh away the sins of the world." This cry, said the speaker, carries us back immediately to the Old Testament. "Behold what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us that we should be called the sons of God," was the third behold. The fourth was from the book of Revelation, "Behold, He cometh."

ST. JOHN DRY DOCK
IN SIGHT AT LAST
Promise of Increased Subsidy Makes Feasible—Could Have Had Dock Long Ago on These Terms.

OTTAWA, Feb. 16.—That the government favors the increased subsidy to the St. John dry dock has been gathered from its action in increasing the subsidy to a basis 25 per cent for 15 years on the cost of the dock and repair plant. Negotiations have not as yet reached a final stage, but are progressing favorably. It is expected that an announcement of the plans of the government in the matter will be made shortly. The dry docks are part of the naval defence policy of the government.

George Robertson of this city said last evening that the increased subsidy was a sufficient guarantee to warrant a start in the erection of the dock. He said that the Imperial Dry Dock Co. could have built the docks a number of years ago had they been given as large an amount.

GIRL IN BALL GOWN DRAGGED FROM SEA

Wound in Head and Torn Dress Proof of Crime

Discovered by Crew of Trolley Car and
Dramatic Denunciation of Man Follows Identification by Mother.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 15.—Clad in a ball gown, the body of Jane Adams, eighteen years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Adams, of this city, was found on the beach here today. A wound in her forehead showed the manner of her death is a deep mystery.

The girl had donned the gown and trinkets and attended a ball on the evening of February 4, on Young's Pier, with her sister Alice and Wm. and Arvis Siler. Her body was frozen and disfigured and the clothing was torn when she was found floating in the sea. A trolley car near Harrisburg avenue, in Ventnor, dragging it up on the beach at the end of the tide, they notified Coroner Sentinelmer and the police. The mother of the girl, who has been seen from time to time, said that she had suffered a sharp point, and that the girl met death by accident.

In the meantime the police have an order to take into custody William Siler, a young married man, who was last seen in the company of the dead girl, and his brother, Arvis, neither of whom can be found. William Siler has a wife and two small children here in destitute circumstances. Surgeons who examined the wound in the girl's head declare it must have been inflicted before the body entered the water.

The hole penetrated to the skull. No bullet could have made the cavity. Examination failed to reveal any other mark of violence. The theory is advanced that she fell from the end of the pier, where she was last seen in the company of Siler, and that in the descent she struck a sharp point.

The younger sister, Alice, sixteen years old, got permission from her mother to go to the North 10th street, to attend the pier entertainment with Arvis Siler.

The police ascertained that outside their sister William Siler and Jane Adams the younger sister says all went to the dance on the pier and afterwards returned to the end of the structure, extending 1,000 feet over the breakers. A half hour later she started to return to the dancing pavilion, but William Siler induced her sister to remain with him. The Adams family state that Alice and her escort returned home and the mother asked of the whereabouts of the elder daughter. Learning that she had been in company with the young married man, she hastened to his home, where she found both brothers.

"I was nearly frightened to death, and I told Will Siler that he had done something to Jane," said the mother. "I told him he lied when he said Jane had left him and started home."

Later in the night Mrs. Adams, still alarmed, made a second visit to Siler's home, and declares admittance was refused.

No suspicion was entertained that the girl had met a tragic fate until the bodies of William Siler and Jane Adams were discovered on the beach. The body of the girl had been dead or dying when she plunged into the sea. The clothes were torn.

WITNESS IN FAMOUS GRAFT CASE IS DEAD

Sixth of Those Mixed Up in the Harrisburg
Capitol Steal Passes Away.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Feb. 16.—The strange fatality that has pursued some of the principal figures in the State Capitol scandal was again brought to public mind today when John E. Scott, one of the chief witnesses in the celebrated case, was found dead in the bath room of the house where he made his home in Harrisburg. He is the sixth man in the case to die. His death was due to heart trouble.

Scott was secretary to the Board of Public Grounds and Buildings which let many of the contracts for furnishing the Capitol that brought more than a dozen men to the bar of justice.
