Deck Floats Clear As Ship Goes Down

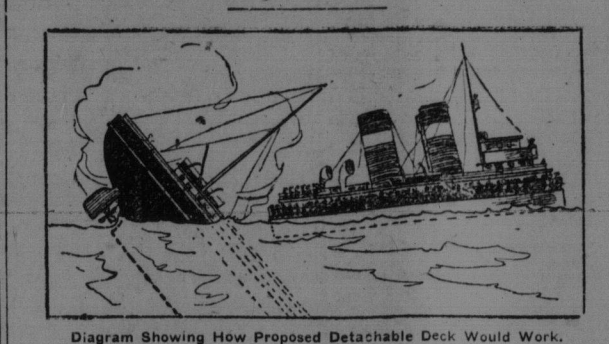


Diagram Showing How Proposed Detachable Deck Would Work.

There would be no "Titanic Death Roll" if the spur deck of the liner had parted from the lower portion of the vessel and floated away with all lives on board.

That is how the crew of a fruit steamer was saved 30 years ago when the boat went to the bottom of Lake Michigan. Then, the top deck, supported by rotten stanchions, broke away from the rest of the ship and floated as a raft.

The accompanying sketch shows how the successive layers of decks, each made water tight, could slip off the hull as the boat foundered, and float as separate rafts until aid could be rushed to the spot.

Such a raft-deck would be fastened securely but in such a fashion that at a moment's warning it could be loosened and made ready to float when the boat tipped downwards. In very large ships it would be advisable to divide the deck up so that there would be several rafts thus available. Fresh water lifeboats and provisions should always be in each division.

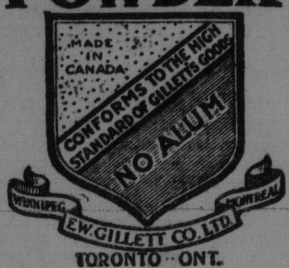
