Country Market.

There will be a fairly good supply of meats and provisions in the country market this morning. Prices have not changed much during the past week, but there is a possibility that, if the cold weather continues there will be a considerable drop next week, as the farmers will be able to bring their produce down river. The retail prices for today are: Turkey, 28 to 32 cents; a pound of chickens, 25 to 30 cents; fowl, 20 to 25 cents; roast beef, 10 to 21 cents; steak, 16 to 24 cents; lamb, 12 to 18 cents; veal, 10 to 16 cents; pork, 16 to 18 cents; and bacon, 22 to 24 cents. Butter is selling for 20 cents a pound retail, and eggs at 20 cents a dozen.
