ODD FELLOWS HAD YEAR OF PROGRESS

Despite abnormal con-
ditions resultant on war
Order showed good gain
in membership and much
activity.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Aug. 11.—
The Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., opened
this morning with a large attendance
of delegates. The degree was confer-
red on 121 candidates, a record num-
ber. The reports of Grand Master,
Chesley and Grand Secretary McKin-
non were adopted.
The former, in supplementing his
report, stated that as the institution
preached the decline of peace, har-
mony and good will something should
be done to aid in the war. A special
committee was appointed to consider
in what form aid could be extended.
They will report later. A motor am-
bulance has been suggested.
The rest of the morning session was
taken up with receiving reports and
roll call of lodges for resolutions.
At Rebekah's Assembly this morn-
ing committees on courtesy and re-
turns reported, also special Red
Cross fund committee. Two hundred
dollars was raised for funds, including
\$150 for beds in Duchess of Con-
naught's hospital, and balance for hos-
pital supplies. The finance committee
recommended increase in per capita
tax from 12 to 14 cents per year. Mrs.
Morrison, Mrs. McGovern and Mrs.
McKean were presented with silver re-
membrances from Alpha Lodge, Char-
lottetown.
Judge Chesley, Grand Master, in his
report gave, at the outset, a review of
the progress of the Order for the past
twelve years, 1903-15, showing the
following increases:

Although the past year has been
one to try institutions, as well as in-
dividuals, Odd Fellowship has stood
the test.
We have held our own and made
some gains in membership. A goodly
number of members are serving in
the Empire. During the year, two
new subordinate lodges and three
new Rebekah lodges have been instal-
led, and one lodge, whose charter was
recalled, has been re-instated.
Fitting reference was made in the
report to the death of the head of the
Order, Grand Sir Robert T. Daniel,
also to two other distinguished breth-
ren, W. L. Kuykendall, Past Grand
Sir, and S. T. Rogers, Grand Master
of the Jurisdiction twenty years ago.
The attention of the representatives
of certain lodges was called to the
fact that their dues are not collected
promptly and systematically. There
should be investigation into the finan-
cial affairs of these lodges, and com-
petent and interested financial secre-
taries should be elected.
The Grand Master also recom-
mended mutual visitations by Grand Of-
ficers or other official representatives
between the Grand Lodges of Eastern
Canada. It would promote interest,
understanding and sympathy and
would help to establish a solidarity in
Canadian Oddfellowship.

Grand Secretary J. J. MacKinnon,
of Charlottetown, reported the net in-
crease of membership for the year to
be 142, bringing the total up to 11,516.
An appeal has been received from
Rev. William Forbes, Past Grand
Master of Liberty Lodge No. 120,
against the action of the Grand Lodge
last session, regarding Brother J. R.
Ferguson of the same lodge.

Notice of motion has been filed to
amend the constitution of Subordinate
Lodges, providing for imposition of
certain penalties upon offending offi-
cers or members.
One hundred and eighty-seven mem-
bers have enlisted for the front. Twen-
ty-one veteran jewels were issued dur-
ing the year.
The total membership up to date is
11,516; 599 being initiated during the
year. Miriam Lodge, St. Stephen,
leads in membership with 288, fol-
lowed by Eureka, Springfield, 285; Scotia,
Westville, 281; Charlottetown, with
two lodges, has a total membership of
510. The weekly benefits paid were
6,613, amounting to \$14,512.79. Relief
for all purposes amounted to \$19,
671.99. The total receipts from dues
were \$39,077.86; admissions and de-
grees, \$8,382.10; invested funds, \$9,
810.48; other sources, \$11,761.52, a to-
tal of \$69,031.76. The current expen-
ses were \$35,858.94, and total assets
\$285,332.93.
The special committee on recom-
mendations recommends, that with a
view of increasing the membership,
the jurisdiction be divided into ten dis-
tricts for general advisory and visita-
tion purposes, and for the work of in-
structing the lodges in degree work
by means of district meetings. These
districts might be: 1, Prince Edward
Island; 2, Newfoundland; 3, Cape Bre-
ton; 4, Antigonish, Guysboro, Pictou
and the Strait Line; 5, Westmoreland,
Cumberland, Colchester and East
Hants Counties; 6, Halifax to Yarmouth;
7, Yarmouth to Windsor; 8, Fred-
erickton and Northwestern New Brun-
swick; 9, Northeastern New Brun-
swick. At these district meetings the
affairs of all the lodges can be con-

FIVE MORE RECRUITS FROM WOODSTOCK

Enlist at Recruiting Meet-
ing last night — Town
loses valued citizen by
Death of James S. Creigh-
ton.

Woodstock, N. B., Aug. 11.—The re-
cruiting meeting held in the open air
this evening was a grand success and
as a result many have expressed their
willingness to sign tomorrow for over-
seas service, and the following five
signed the roll tonight: Harry Lind-
say, Charles Adams, Alfred Adams,
John Watts and Charles Wilkinson.
His Worship Mayor Sutton presid-
ed and in his remarks he stated that
since the war began this town has re-
cruited over 400 men, 150 of whom
were in the 55th Battalion.
Lieut. Brooks, Hon. W. P. Jones
and T. C. L. Ketchum were the speak-
ers of the evening. It was pointed
out to the former that twenty men
had reported here for service since
the recruiting officer had left, and
they had gone back home, and Lieut.
Brooks promised that a recruiting
officer would again be on duty tomor-
row.

James S. Creighton, one of our lead-
ing citizens, died tonight after a long
illness, although only a short time
confinement to the house. He was fifty
years of age and leaves a widow, for-
merly Miss Nellie Willbur. He was a
native of Halifax, but the greater part
of his life he has been connected with
the Bank of Montreal here. He has

GOLD SHIPMENT FROM LONDON TO J. P. MORGAN & CO.


Amounting to 1,050,000
ounces of United States
gold coin, equivalent to
\$19,534,200.

New York, Aug. 11.—J. P. Morgan &
Company announce that they received
a shipment of gold today from London
via Halifax, amounting to 1,050,000
ounces of United States gold coin. On
the basis of \$18.604 an ounce the total
value of the coin would be \$19,534,200.
It was rumored in Wall Street that
the gold and securities totalled be-
tween \$30,000,000 and \$50,000,000 and
was generally stated that the securities
were chiefly American railroad bonds
and preferred shares of American rail-
road stocks.

FARM LABORERS'

EXCURSIONS TO THE WEST.

With the promise of a bumper crop
in the west, the Governments of Mani-
toba, Saskatchewan and Alberta have
called upon Eastern Canada for thirty

thousand harvest help laborers to as-
sist them in saving the harvest. The
Canadian Government Railways will
sell harvesters tickets to Winnipeg
from all stations in the Maritime Pro-
vinces, Tuesday, August 17th, and
Tuesday, August 24th, to Winnipeg,
at very low rates the fare from Mon-
ton to Winnipeg being \$13.95, and the
fares from other stations will be in
proportion.

The route will be via the Inter-
colonial to Montreal, Grand Trunk to
North Bay, Temiskaming and North-
ern Ontario to Cochrane, thence trans-
continental to Winnipeg.
Fares based on half a cent per mile
may be obtained at Winnipeg to all
points west in Manitoba, Saskatche-
wan and Alberta. Returning tickets
will be issued to bona-fide excursion-
ists at very low rates.
