There was certainly some class to

It was real good ball from start to

singled and scored O'Brien.

In the eighth inning Dutton reach-

managed to hit safe past the pitcher who  
felt in trying to field the ball. Jordan  
hit a sacrifice to Sullivan at sec-  
ond and Dutton scored. Winter fled  
out trying to steal third. The

**FIFTEEN**

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 11.—Although  
batted from the box in yesterday's  
game between Boston and Chicago,  
Joe Wood, of the Boston club, is given  
credit for the victory, which was  
his fifteenth straight. According to  
a ruling of President Johnson, of the

**GOVERNOR**  
**WILL STOP**  
**THE FIGHT**

Albany, N. Y., September 11.—Gov-  
ernor Dix has taken steps to prevent  
the proposed ten-round bout between  
Ad Wolfst, the lightweight cham-  
pion and Packer McFarland, of  
Chicago, at Madison Square Garden,  
New York, the latter part of the month.  
In a letter to Julius Harburger, sheriff  
of New York county, the governor  
says that complaints have been filed  
with him to the effect that this bout  
is being arranged under such cir-  
cumstances as will virtually amount  
to a prize fight. He calls upon the  
league to use every means to stop the  
contest. In a letter to District Ator-  
ney Whitman, the governor requests  
him to co-operate with Sheriff Harbur-  
ger. The governor also sent a letter  
to Frank O'Neill, chairman of the State  
Athletic Commission, calling for an  
immediate report as to whether a  
license has been issued by the com-  
mission authorizing this bout.

**LEGER RACE**

Doncaster, Eng., Sept. 11.—The St.  
Leger stakes of 6,500 sovereigns for  
colts and fillies foaled in 1909, was  
won here today by August Belmont's
