Berlin, Dec. 2.—Huge militaristic plans on the part of France and Belligium in the occupied zone of Germany, it is feared here, are intended as preparations for an immediate advance into the interior in the event of Germany's failure to pay the war indemnity promptly. A notable article appearing in the leading German Socialist newapaper "Vorwarts" expressing this apprehension has created considerable sensation here and in neutral countries.

The article says in part:

The budget estimates now submitted to the Reichstag give the appalling figure of 15,000,000,000 marks for expenses of the occupation troops and Emente Commissions. It is only a vough estimate, and it is doubtful if this sum will be sufficient. 


