TWEEDDALE, BENTLEY AND McGUIRE TRIO CHOSEN FOR N. B. PROHIBITION BOARD

Chairman is the Ex-Minister of Agriculture, Who Will Receive a Salary for His Work — Others Will be Paid When Required—March 17th is Likely Date of Opening of the Legislature With A. A. Dymart as Speaker.

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 10.—The New Brunswick prohibition commission was appointed this morning by the Provincial Government and will take charge of the importation and wholesale distribution of liquor in the province as soon as they have time to organize.

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, former Minister of Agriculture, is the chairman of the commission, and the two other members are Martin McGuire, of St. John, and A. F. Bentley, ex-M. L. A., of St. Martins. The chairman will give his entire time to his duties, while the other members will act in an advisory capacity.

Salary for Chairman.

Premier Foster in making the announcement of the appointment, said that the salary of the chairman will not yet be fixed. The other members of the commission will be paid a per diem allowance and travelling expenses when engaged in their official duties.

The Premier announced that Fredericton would be the headquarters of the commission.

Mr. Tweeddale was Minister of Agriculture in the Foster Government until defeated in the recent general elections. Mr. McGuire has been in the Legislature some years ago and was defeated as a government candidate in St. John county at the last provincial elections.

Mr. Tweeddale was the mover at the last session of the Legislature of the resolution in favor of a referendum upon the question of importation of liquor into the province for personal use, which was defeated.

House to Meet.

Thursday, March 17, was tentatively named as the date for the opening of the Legislature this morning.

"The exact date will depend upon how long the trial of the Heston case election takes," said Premier Foster. "February 17 is the date that has been set for the opening of that case, and it is not the disposition of the Government to call the Legislature at a time when it will be interfered with by the trial of that case. March 17, therefore, regarded as the probable date for the opening of the session, but the Legislature will be summoned earlier if the circumstances make that possible."



In its circular issued today the company states it has decided to take this step as the best method of keeping at many men employed as possible.

Pair Under Arrest Confess to Police After Gun and Masks Are Discovered.

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 10.—Ernest Scullion and Harry Stanley Ross were arrested by the Moncton police tonight on the charge of holding up a citizen at the point of a gun last night. The man held up was Millidge LeBlanc, who took the receipt at the Scotia Steel and Coal Company. After being taken into custody Scullion and Ross admitted the charge. The guns and masks with which the prisoners were armed were found in a hold-up occurred were secured by the police. INVERNESS MINE WORKERS ARE IN SERIOUS STATE

Closing of Mines and Non-Payment of Arrears of Wages Hits Men Hard.

ASKS GOVERNMENT TO BUY MUCH COAL

Suggested That Federal Authorities Purchase 1,000 Tons Weekly.

Inverness, N. S., Feb. 10.—As a result of the closing of the mines here and the non-payment of wages arrears to the miners, there is very little money in circulation here and unless some pay is forthcoming very soon living conditions in this town will be very bad.

As previously reported, miners here were to be paid all arrears in full this week, an estimated amount of \$51,000. The present management, however demand that the men sign a document absolving the company from any undertakings that might have been agreed to by former operators of the mine.

Men Are Determined.

Whether this will result in a deadlock is not yet known as the men are not disposed to commit themselves. Secretary MacLachlan is expected here tomorrow evening. The men would work for a few weeks for a lesser wage is vigorously denied. The board of trade meets tomorrow to consider the proposals that the Federal government take a thousand tons per week of Inverness coal at cost price for a short time to avert threatened distress and want, affecting the whole community of three thousand persons. The management are considering the advisability of the present hundred men employed refusing to work until all the facts concerning the present unfortunate situation are fully known.

Relief is Essential.

Halifax, Feb. 10.—Relief measures on a large scale will be urgently needed in Inverness if the present unemployment in that mining town continues for any length of time, said Rev. H. G. Wright, secretary of the Inverness delegation, over the long distance phone from Inverness tonight. The delegation was to have arrived in Halifax this evening, but owing to the delays on the Inverness railway, was not able to make connections with the main line express to Halifax, and therefore will not arrive here until tomorrow.

To See Premier.

The delegation is to interview the provincial government with regard to the re-opening of the mines closed several days and which is the cause of the present very bad conditions affecting the town. The delegation will also have a meeting with the Eastern Trust Company, who represent the National Trust Company, the trustees for the bond holders of the Inverness Coal Company.

FREDERICTON TO BE DISTRIBUTION PLACE OF DRINK

Condemn Vocational Training


The Board of Education met this afternoon to consider a number of routine matters of business. All the members of the board, except His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, were present. Before the board met they were given the privilege of hearing a delegation of Mrs. J. V. Lawlor and Mrs. R. J. Hooper, of St. John, address the Government in the matter of the vocational work in St. John. The delegation stated that the money expended to carry out the vocational work in that city was wasted, and that the act ought to be abolished. They concluded with a general criticism of the work of the vocational director for the province, Fletcher Pearson, who was present and defended the administration.

Cabinet Sessions Over

The Provincial Government concluded their session here this afternoon. Premier Foster and most of the members of the Government left for their homes this evening, although several ministers are remaining to clear up some department business.

AUSTRIA'S BIG DEFICIT

Vienna, Feb. 10.—A deficit of 40,000,000 crowns is shown in the supplementary budget of the Austrian Government for the fiscal year. If the demands of the civil servants now pending are granted, providing for an increase of 5,000 crowns for each employee monthly, it is estimated the deficit will be increased to 55,000,000 crowns.
