Lord Chancellor Said It Would Have Practically Abolished Marriage.

London, May 1.—The divorce bill, intro-duced by Earl Russell, was thrown out in the house of lords this afternoon. The bill provided for divorce on five grounds in addition to the causes already valid in England. Lord Russell said the bill would not increase immorality, but would make happier homes.

The lord chancellor, Earl Halsbury

characterized the bill as practically abolishing the institution of marriage and said it was an outrage that it should have been introduced. The lord chancellor then moved its rejection, which was carried.
