Fredericton, N. B., July 5 .- (Special)-York municipal council convened in annual session this morning and adjourned this evening after transacting considerable business. The half yearly accounts showed receipts of \$15,763.69 and an expenditure of \$15,017.45, leaving a balance of \$746.24.
