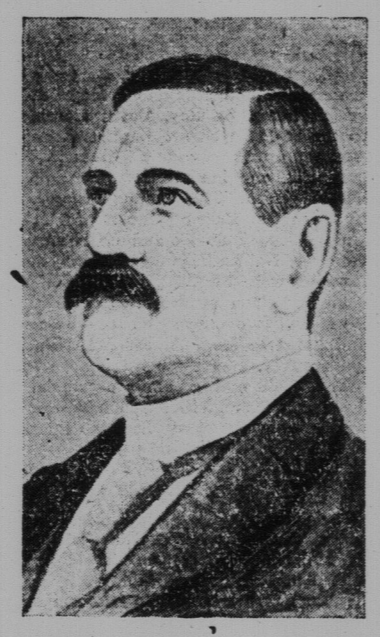

LIBERALS WIN BOTH SEATS

Hyman and Smith Returned Minister of Public Works Had 330 Majority, and North Oxford Went for Government Candidate by 349-- Great Rejoicing at Ottawa Over the Result.

London, Ont., June 13.—(Special)—Hon. Charles S. Hyman and Hon. James Sutherland returned to Ottawa yesterday afternoon. Mr. Hyman, who was chosen to succeed the late Hon. James Sutherland as minister of public works, was returned today by a majority of 330 over William Gray, who gave Mr. Hyman such a close run at the general election. The school question was the chief issue for the Conservatives, but it is claimed tonight that the election was not decided on the issue.

The city tonight is in a state of turmoil celebrating Hon. Mr. Hyman's victory. The victor is receiving telegrams of congratulation from all parts of the dominion, showing the interest in the result. When the result became a foregone conclusion both candidates made speeches. Hon. Mr. Hyman said that the verdict was ample justification of the government's policy on provincial autonomy and showed clearly that the people could not be swayed by appeals to race and religious prejudice.

The defeated candidate claimed that the sinews of war at the disposal of the minister had been too much for him. The result by wards were: Ward. Hyman. Gray. One. 1,135 1,054 Two. 945 738 Three. 1,200 1,254 Four. 1,274 1,229 Total. 4,553 4,273 Majority for Hyman 280.

Smith Wins by 349 Majority. Woodstock, Ont., June 13.—(Special)—North Oxford, the seat left vacant by the death of Hon. James Sutherland, remains Liberal. Today's polling gave George Smith, the government candidate, a majority of 349 over the Conservative candidate, Mr. Wallace.

Conservative and consolation over the reduction from the majority of 1,500 given Hon. Mr. Sutherland at the general election. The constituency has been liberal by large majorities since confederation.

Joy at Ottawa. Ottawa, June 13.—(Special)—The triumphant return of two Liberals, had a very depressing effect upon Mr. Borden and his followers this evening. It followed the return of the government was jubilant. A city and a country constituency in the strongest Protestant part of Ontario have stood by the verdict of the west.

When the returns were coming in from Woodstock, Hon. John Haggarty said that the Conservative candidate did not get 500 of a majority in Woodstock, the Liberals would be elected. When he was told that he had only 290, he said, "London is going to carry the city. The opposition saw this of some of them maintained that North Oxford was theirs.

Number 6, the headquarters of the Conservatives, was soon deserted. There was nothing but mourning here. Room 10, the Liberal headquarters, was crowded, and the excitement was intense. EQUITABLE REBUKE FROM CLEVELAND

Accepting Trusteeship He Says, "We Shall be Safer When We Look on Personal Use of Property in Trust as on Other Stealing." New York, June 12.—"We can better afford to slacken our pace than to abandon our old, simple, American standards of honesty, and we shall be safer if we retain our old habit of looking at the appropriation for personal uses of property and interests held in trust in the same light as other forms of stealing."

Robertson, of Milltown, N. B., be appointed at a salary of \$1,000 per year.

Principal Falconer, of Halifax; Principal Spranger, of Montreal and Rev. Dr. Neil, of Toronto, supported the recommendation. The assembly decided to make the appointment.

In the afternoon church unity negotiations with the Baptist and Congregationalists were considered and both sides were calmly discussed. The preponderance of opinion favored further negotiations and the committee of the church was continued. It was the expressed opinion that organic union would really advance the Evangelium.

A brilliant audience gathered at night to listen to the delegates from the Church of Scotland, Rev. Dr. Norman McLeod and Rev. Dr. J. Milford Mitchell, who gave stirring addresses and were frequently applauded. The distinguished visitors go to Toronto and Niagara Falls tomorrow.

Addresses were made by the Grand High Priest, Charles R. Smith, K. T. of Amherst, Hon. Senator Ross, S. C. of Amherst, and Hon. William Logan.

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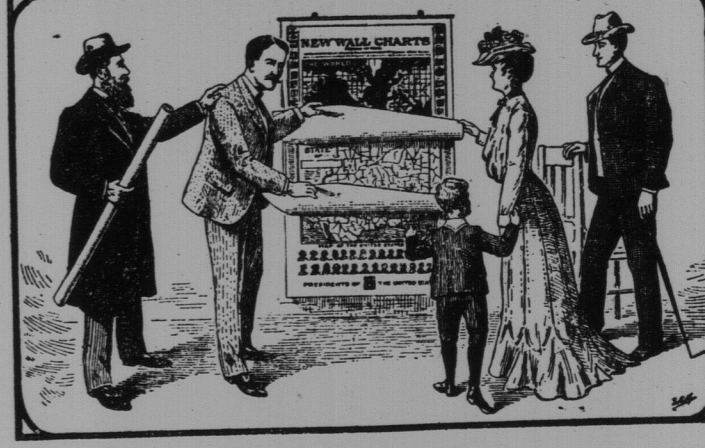

This remarkable couple were married in Amherst, on June 13, 1841, by Rev. Dr. Tupper, father of Sir Charles Tupper, at the residence of Mrs. Prince's uncle, the late William Logan, graduate of the present member for Moncton, June 23, 1818, and was the second son of the late Thomas Prince, who came to Moncton from Portland, Maine, in June 1818, and went into mercantile business.

Mr. Prince spent some of his early life in Nova Scotia, being book keeper in the Halifax Chronicle office for five years. In 1870 he was appointed to a clerkship in the I. C. R. office at Moncton and has lived here ever since.

Mrs. Prince was the third daughter of the late Noah G. Fuller, lineal descendant of Dr. Fuller of Mayflower fame and was born in Lower Horton, N. S., Feb. 8, 1821. Both Mr. and Mrs. Prince are descendants of old English families.

Among the family heirlooms, the aged couple have in their possession, is a ring used by Mr. Prince's great grandfather, Rev. Joseph Prince, 160 years old. This aged couple still have very good health. Mr. Prince is remarkably bright and smart for his years, but Mrs. Prince suffers somewhat from paralysis, although still in possession of her mental faculties.
