## V.-FRENCH.

(Five hours a week for five years.)

Students will follow the course of French Grammar, or that of French Literature, according to their qualifications.

N. B.—This course is obligatory for the first two years; after the second year, the student may choose between French and Greek.)

## VI.-GREEK.

(Three hours a week for the last three years of the Arts Course.)

## Degrees.

Candidates for Degrees are required to pass examinations on all subjects mentioned in the Programme of Studies.

The Matriculation Examination is passed at the end of the first year of the Course on that year's programme in Latin, English, Mathematics, Sciences, and French.

For convenience, all the subjects are divided into two categories, of which Latin, Greek, English, History, Geography, and Elementary French form one; and Philosophy, Mathematics, the Sciences, and (for Catholic students) Christian Doctrine, the other.

N. B.—Hereafter candidates for Degrees may substitute advanced FRENCH for GREEK. Students who avail themselves of the privilege of this substitution will be required to gain one-half of all the marks allowed for an examination in French essay-writing and oral translation of French into English, and English into French.
