Although the late Duchess died on the 16th, her funeral was not to take place before the 26th ultimo. The London Times of the 10th says:—

"Till then the body will remain at Frogmore. On the day fixed for the interment the remains will be removed from Frogmore to Windsor at 4 o'clock in the morning, and with the strictest privacy. As the distance from Frogmore to Windsor is little over a mile, the body will by this arrangement, be laid in the Wolsey Chapel, adjoining the Chapel Royal, before daylight. Here it will remain until the hour fixed for the funeral ceremony, when the procession will be formed and the process of the British arms.
