Melbourne, April 11.—Russell Campbell Bros., garage proprietors, of this village, is dead, and three automobile bandits. Sidney Murrell, aged 21; his brother, Wm. George Murrell, aged 22; and Henry J. Williams, of London, are in jail at London, charged with Campbell's murder, as the result of an attempt to rob the local branch of the Home Bank at 11 o'clock this morning. A fourth member of the bandits gaing is being pursued in the neighborhood of Mount Brydges and Komoka, and thus far has evaded capture by taking refuge in a swamp.
