DISTRICT AND GENERAL

The bill for death penalty in Michigan was killed by a vote of 49 to 48. Dr. Grass, a veterinary of Dresden, was fined \$50 and costs for abusing liquor prescription privileges.

T. W. Sims has disposed of the West Lorne Sun and Rodney Mercury to Mr. Lashbrook of Mitchell.

J. D. Gillis and B. A. Gladstone have purchased the general store business of John Tolson at Highgate.

While playing ball at school Willie Benner, an Alvinston boy, had the misfortune to break his ankle in two places.

A St. Catharines man saved his house from being destroyed by fire the other day by organizing his eleven children into a bucket brigade.

The canning factory at Alvinston has secured a good acreage for the summer, guaranteeing growers from \$12 to \$14 a ton for their corn, which is a slight reduction over last year's prices.

Eleven newly-arrived Britishers were recently placed on Lambton farms by the district representative. Experienced men will be paid \$30 to \$35 a month and inexperienced \$20 to \$25 a month with board.

A young farmer took a full grown cow hide to town the other day and sold it for 95 cents. Then he put 55 cents more, to the proceeds and bought a cheap grade razor strap about 15 inches long and two inches wide.

A farmer near Wingham was overcome by the heat on Wednesday while working in the fields and had to have the attention of a doctor. The horse with which he was working was also overcome. The temperature in that district reached about 90 degrees.

Wm. Bowie and Albert Ashton of Strathroy, both aged 21 years, were sentenced to two and a half years respectively for breaking into and stealing from the Cuddy hardware and Keyser's pool room in that town on the night of March 24.

An amendment to the marriage act has been introduced in the Legislature which will put the issuing of marriage licenses entirely in the hands of the municipal clerks and fixes the fee for a marriage license at \$5. Of the fee \$4 will go to the province and \$1 to the municipality.

A woman clairvoyant at Rockport, Ill., told Mrs. Mary Thomas, aged 45, that a man would woo her soon. A man appeared, told of his orange groves in California, and won Mrs. Thomas quickly. She gave him \$7,000 in cash and on the day set for the wedding he went out to get some cigars and did not return. The clairvoyant is also missing.

A very sudden death occurred in Dunwich Friday evening, when John M. Hauser, aged 74 years, passed away, being found dead a short distance from the barn, where he had evidently been putting in the sheep. Mr. Hauser resided for many years near New Glasgow, going about eight years ago to reside with his niece, Mrs. Witherden, near the Aliborough-Dunwich townline.

James George, an Indian of the Muncie Reserve, had his thumb all but cut off Thursday morning while working in Frank Henderson's bush, on the townline west of Pinal. He was driving a wedge into a tree when his axe caught in another tree, was deflected and nearly severed his thumb, which only hung by a piece of skin. Martin Ninham, another Indian, bound the thumb up with a chip of wood, and George was taken to Sheddin for treatment. There is a chance of saving it, the doctor says.

Deceased, as Helen Hurst, was a popular Glencoe young lady, beloved by all who knew her. For several years she was organist of the Glencoe Presbyterian church and also filled the position of organist in the Methodist church for a time. The following announcement of her death is from the Edmonton Journal:

The death occurred at the residence of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Hurst, 1148 82nd street, on Wednesday afternoon, April 6, of Helen Annette Murphy, wife of James Walter Murphy. The deceased had a host of friends in this city and was for a number of years previous to her marriage last year organist at the Norwood Methodist church and prominently known for her activities in that church and other circles. Mrs. Murphy leaves to mourn her loss her husband, mother and father, and two brothers, William, manager of the Merchants Bank at Lamont, and George, accountant for the Scott Fruit Co., Edmonton. The deceased is also survived by a baby girl just one day old. The funeral service will be held Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the Norwood Methodist church. Rev. W. H. Irwin will officiate. MELBOURNE MAN SHOT

Russell Campbell Killed in Battle With Bandits—Exciting Time Over Attempted Bank Robbery

Melbourne, April 11.—Russell Campbell, aged 33, of Campbell Bros. garage proprietors, of this village, is dead, and three automobile bandits, Sidney Murrell, aged 21; his brother, Wm. George Murrell, aged 22, and Henry J. Williams, of London, are in jail at London, charged with Campbell's murder, as the result of an attempt to rob the local branch of the Home Bank at 11 o'clock this morning. A fourth member of the bandit gang is being pursued in the neighborhood of Mount Brydges and Komoka, and thus far has evaded capture by taking refuge in a swamp. Posses of police and farmers are scouring the country and watching all trains.

The staff of the Home Bank here is made up of R. E. McAndless, formerly of Thorndale, manager; Miss Agnes Campbell, teller, and Miss Irma Wright, ledger keeper. Miss Wright was just leaving the bank to have the Union Bank across the way mark a cheque when the robbers brushed by her, going into the premises.

She rushed into a store next door and gave the alarm. A phone message was sent to central, and the girl there warned many places. The first called was Campbell's garage, and the three brother proprietors, Russell, Stuart and Robert A., hurried into the street.

Stuart stepped into a hardware store and borrowed a small-calibre rifle, but could get no cartridges. Nevertheless he, with Robert and Russell, ran to the scene of the robbery, and he pointed the rifle at two men in the front of the bank office and shouted to them to throw up their hands.

The robbers jumped to the back and opened a door leading into an alley. The Campbell, blocked the alley and, according to the reports, it was Sidney Murrell who shot Russell, using a 38-calibre military type revolver. Then Murrell fired at Robert Campbell, but the latter jumped beside a stairway and escaped by a hair's breadth.

Murrell next made a leap for liberty out of the doorway and Robert Campbell seized him from behind. The thug shook him off, but Stuart seized him, and with several other men bore him to the ground. Then William Murrell was seen leaving the front door with a grip, which was afterwards found to contain \$10,000 of the bank's funds.

By this time Manager E. S. Theaker of the Union Bank appeared on the scene with a revolver, and he fired at the bandit, wounding him in the hand. Murrell dropped the satchel and his gun and shouted: "I'm through."

With his brother he was tied by the wrists to a telephone pole and the London police were notified.

Someone at this juncture remembered that there had been four of the robbers, and immediately a hunt began for the missing man. Finally tracks were seen leading to a barn at the rear of the bank, and the place was surrounded. An Indian named Wilfrid Danford volunteered to search the place, and he soon pulled Williams from under the hay and pitched him headlong through a door in the upper storey to where the crowd were waiting below.

Inspector of Detectives Thos. Nickle and Detective Harry Down drove in the police car to the scene, and took charge of the prisoners. As the citizens realized that one of their number had been cruelly murdered, a few of the hotter heads began to talk of more violence, and the officers were compelled to take their quarry back to London.

While the prisoners were lashed to the pole an infuriated crowd of Russell Campbell reached over and knocked one of the Murrells down. Then Stuart Campbell, brother of Russell, walked up to Sidney Murrell. "You killed my brother," he shouted. "I'm not denying it," was the reply of the murderer, though the answer was more whining than defiant.

Miss Agnes Campbell (no relation to the man shot) and Miss Irma Wright are the heroines of the day. Miss Campbell, when she saw the bandits with revolvers in the bank, slammed the door of the safe shut, leaving only such ready money as was in the till at the mercy of the robbers. For some unknown reason the men did not bother her, and she rushed out of the place unmolested. Then she and Miss Wright spread the alarm broadcast.

Manager McAndless had a terrible experience. The robbers went into his private office and beat him over the head with their revolvers. They shouted to him to open the safe, but after the first few blows he feigned unconsciousness, and by so doing probably saved his life.

It is known that the bandits stole the Gray-Dort car they used at Lambeth, and that they drove through Melbourne at about 5 o'clock this morning. They then went a couple of miles beyond the village to the farm of George Stevenson, on the fourth sideroad of Ekfrid. There they entered the farm lane and lit a bonfire, cooking their breakfast. Stevenson asked them what they were up to and they said they expected a shipment of whiskey when the first train passed through Melbourne. They remained until about 10:30, when they drove back to the village and made the attempt to rob the bank.

Russell Campbell, the victim of the bandits, was a son of the late J. G.

Campbell. He is survived by his mother, three brothers, George, Stuart and R. A., and one sister. He enlisted in the 33rd Battalion in London in 1915, and was later attached to the 49th Alberta Battalion at the front. He was four years in the trenches, and was once wounded.

The pursuit of the fourth robber was highly sensational. Racing across the fields with a crowd of pursuers on his heels, he reached the farm of a man named Miles, and stole the latter's car out of the garage. Miles met him tearing out of the lane but was unable to stop him. Later the police and several farmers caught sight of him going towards Mount Brydges, and they gave chase. They got near enough to fire several shots at him, when they suddenly saw him turn the car abruptly into a farm lane and jump out of it. The pursuers were going so fast they ran several hundred yards by the lane before they could stop. When they reached the car the bandit had given them the slip and had entered a swamp. The posse found that the fugitive had to abandon the auto, a Ford, because the owner the night before had drained the water out of the radiator, and as a consequence the machine ran hot after a few miles.

The Murrells have long been known to the police, and one of the officers stated tonight that there has been a suspicion about the brothers knew something about the robbery at the G.T.R. station here in January, when auto bandits got away with an express box containing about \$1,000. An exploded cartridge found in the laundry of Lee Bros., Wharfedale road, who were robbed and terribly injured on Saturday night, fits the revolver found on Sidney Murrell, and the police say the Murrells are the men who committed the crime. Immediately after the shooting Dr. W. H. Woods, coroner, of Strathroy, was notified, and ordered an inquest. A jury was impaneled and viewed the scene, which had been taken to the undertaking parlors of Geo. Spenceburg. The inquest was adjourned to resume on Thursday next at 2 p.m. at the Woodmen's Hall here.

The coroner's jury is composed of A. D. Brown, foreman; W. Tanner, Wilson Richards, N. McNeil, R. Parr, George A. Stevenson, Henry McCracken, Robert Hardy, George Spenceburg. A post-mortem will be conducted by Dr. R. D. Dewar, of Melbourne and Dr. L. W. M. Freese of Glencoe.

Several songs were sung also and orchestral selections rendered by the "minstrels." A jazz band also distinguished itself in several numbers. A piano duet by Mrs. Anderson and Miss Martyn of Alvinston was greatly enjoyed. After doing justice to a nicely-prepared lunch served by the ladies, Peter McArthur, on behalf of the men folk, introduced a hearty vote of thanks to the members of the club for their splendid entertainment, which was acknowledged in brief addresses by Mrs. McArthur, president of the club, and by Mrs. Mayhew on behalf of the colored artists.

A BAD BIT OF ROAD

The Alvinston Free Press says:—Between Alvinston and London there is not to be found a worse stretch of road than is to be found in the four odd miles between here and where the M. C. R. crosses the townline of Glencoe road. It's a shame that the people of this community have to put up with such a road when from the time one passes the crossing until London is reached no better stretch can be found. The piece of road in question has always been a Jonah to motorists and others, and it's about time that something was done to get matters remedied.

THE MELBOURNE TRAGEDY

The country for miles around is still very much excited over the tragedy enacted at Melbourne on Monday morning. A sharp lookout is being kept for the fourth bandit, and every few hours some new clue is followed up or a suspected stranger apprehended. Searching parties, fully armed, are scouring the country around in hopes of catching the fugitive. On Tuesday afternoon word was passed along to Bothwell that a suspected party was riding on a C. P. R. westbound freight train. When the train stopped at North Bothwell the man left the train and took to the woods. He was soon surrounded by armed posse and placed under arrest. It was felt sure that the right man had been secured, but investigation showed that the captors were mistaken. This is only one instance of many.

The funeral of the murdered man, Russell Campbell, was held at Melbourne yesterday afternoon and was conducted with full military honors. The funeral services were in charge of the Glencoe branch of the Great War Veterans' Association, of which the deceased was a member.
