munications related items in the budget, be referred to the next CYSF meeting to allow the newspaper's board of publications to discuss the cuts. This motion also failed and a motion to grant the newspaper \$16,000 for this year was then passed.

Council voted in favour of a motion to grant Radio York \$9,000 for this year except for Klein who abstained. She said she felt that any money given to Radio York was "going down the drain."

Edson supported the grant. "Radio York is on the verge of getting an FM community licence. The university is studying the feasibility of helping the radio station to the tune of \$50,000. To defeat this \$9,000 proposal would kill that. It is supported by John Becker and by his superior, Bill Farr."

The council voted to accept the resignation of Andrew Madden as vice-president of academic affairs and Cindy Park as vice-president of university services. Madden was replaced at the meeting by Brad Clarida, recently elected in the November by-elections, and Park was replaced by Al Dale.

Other budgetary items include a CYSF contribution of \$5,144 to the Course Union Commission, which represents an upward adjustment from the original planned contribution of \$4,500. A grant of \$22,000 will be given to external affairs, which includes conferences and membership in the Ontario Federation of Students and the National Union of Students. The National Student Day and the petition campaign to protest tuition fee increase were each given \$300.

The student handbook was granted \$1,500. CYSF also granted a total of \$9,700 to social and cultural affairs, including \$2,000 to the social cooperative, \$500 to the multi-cultural festival, \$7,000 to campus clubs, and \$200 for miscellaneous events. The council voted as well to give Harbinger \$8,000.

CYSF voted to raise the amount they had originally budgeted for the Womens' Centre from \$450 to \$800. They voted to keep \$5,000 to cover expenses for the summer of 1977.

The total budget for 1976-77 adds up to \$106,544.
