Mone of us who were at the University in those days will ever forget the fight made at that time for freedom of speech on matters of social and economic concern. Some of us who were born Liberals took naturally to the attack upon what, even in those days, we regarded as a fundamental right. It may interest you to know that your father gave me, as a boy, much material bearing on the labor problem. My interest in the cause of Labor was not a little aroused by the many talks I had with him. That interest has grown and intensified with the years.
