My dear Fauteux:

I appreciate very much your letter of 3nd April. At the first opportunity I will take to state in the House what I have said at various places in the country on the subject of my views on what is called the Imperialist Question. In this connection I am sending you today Hansard containing the speech of the present Prime Minister on the Motion of Mr. Woodsworth. Therein you will find underlined certain references which go as far as I have gone at any time. I also attach herewith extract from a speech of Sir Wilfred Laurier on the day of August 1914. Sir Wilfred went much farther there, athatpis; he spoke in much more general terms than I have done at any time. As you know I have never concealed my belief that in the association of the British Empire we have not only the preservation of our finest tradition but the strongest shield of our security.
