## THE CABBAGE-ROOT MAGGOT

(Phorbia brassica Bouche).

THERE are few insects attacking vegetables which cause greater loss and disappointment than the one which as a small white naggot is often found infesting the roots of cabbages, cauliflowers, ape, turnips, and radishes.

During early spring and summer, in the seed-bed and in the permanent plantation, the leaves of certain cabbage and cauliflower plants frequently turn yellow, wilt, and droop. If an examination is

hade of the roots a number of maggots, varying in size but attaining the length of  $\frac{1}{3}$  inch will be found embedded beneath a slimy mass of decaying vegetation and soil. With radishes and turnips similar
