MR. WRIGHT'S CRIME.

The Hamilton Herald, Independent Miberal, says:

A stranger, reading the editorial remarks in Ontario Liberal newspapers these days, would receive the impression that one of the meanest villains at large in this province at present is a man named A. W. Wright. He would learn from the Toronto Globe that this man Wright is a scandalmonger, and he would gather from the Hamilton Times that Wright is "a Tory muck-rake man," one who cultiwates the friendship of "a thief-chum," and who has excited "general public disgust." Naturally he would enquire what horrible offence this man had committed that he should be so execrated. And this is what he would Bearn:

That Mr. Wright is the chief organ azer of the Conservative party in this province; that he learned from a former member of the legislature that a man in Buffalo was willing to give important information respecting corsuption practiced in behalf of Liberal candidates in recent Ontario elections; that he saw a letter from this Buffalo man to the same effect; that he went to Buffalo, saw this man, and also another, both of whom told him about the aforesaid corrupt practices in which they claimed to have been implicated; that he questioned them separately and found their stories to agree in detail; that they professed their willingness to repeat their statements on oath; that he secured from .them affidavits, duly signed and witenessed, containing the information which they had originally given to

We do not believe that our stranger would feel like condemning Mr. Wright as a scandalmonger, an associate of thieves, a muck-rake man and a general reprobate. We believe he would be inclined to think well of Mr. Wright for acting with promptitude and energy in the discharge of a duty which he owed to his party-nay, to the public.

In the name of decency and comamon sense, is it mot the duty of every good citizen, in order that the cause of electoral purity may be aided, to assist in obtaining evidence of corruption and disclose it at the proper time and place? Unless evidence of corrupt acts is obtained-and obtained. too, from the agents of corruption themselves, who know most about itshow can electoral crookedness be exposed and punished?

It may be that these Buffalo men have deceived Mr. Wright and sworn to what is false. For our part, we heartily hope they have, for their statements implicate Canadians whom we would hate to regard as guilty of corrupt acts. But whether they have perjured themselves or have told the truth is yet to be learned. Even if they are perjurers, however, that fact will not discredit Mr. Wright in the least. He has done his duty. LARGE SEIZURE OF NETS. Twenty-six Found by Captain Mc-Auley in Georgian Bay.

Toronto, May 7. - Captain Mc-Auley of the Government Fisheries cruiser Gilplice has reported a big haul of trap nets on Georgian Bay. A few days ago Mr. S. T. Basredo, Deputy Commissioner of Fisheries, received information of the presence of a number of trap nets in the meighborhood of the Bustard Islands and Bad River He notified Capt. Mc-Auley, with instructions to pay a flying visit to the locality. The result was the seizure of 26 nets, which were found in two days. This is the largest seizure ever made in that space of time on Georgian Bay. The nets will all be burned. They are always covered with tar, and the conflagration made by this huge pile will make an expensive bonfire for the owners. Each net is valued at from \$25 to \$50. The seizure is an important one, as the pickerel are now running, and their most favorite haunt at such periods is "the Bustards." The catch, therefore, means the preservation of millions of these excellent game fish, for which the summer anglers will be thankful. tedo, Deputy Commissioner of Fish-
