OBITUARY.

Nearly every year the first meeting of literary Society is adjourned out of respectively memory of some of its members who have in the long vacation. This year the name of Thomas Patric : Corcoran will claim this mark of sorrowful remembrance from those who were last year his fellow-students. Mr. Corcoran matriculated in 1875 into the University, and graduated in June of this year (being then not quite twenty years of age), with honours in Mental and Moral Science and Civil Polity. He died of typhoid fever, at his father's house, in Stratford, on the 26th of tember, after an illness of eleven days. In his undergraduate career, without being a popular man, he secured the respect of everyone and the warm friendship of those who knew him best. He was a graceful and effective reader, and the Society's prize for elocution was to have been presented him at convocation.
