PARADE COMMITTEE

Arrangements Completed for Three Days in Old Home Week.

The general parade committee of Old Home Week held a large and enthusiastic meeting last night at headquarters in the Temple Building when plans for parades for the week were discussed. Owing to the inability of Col. Ashton to be present, Capt. Colquhoun was elected vice-chairman in which capacity he will act for the remainder of the year.
It was proposed at last night's meeting to have a parade of the manufacturers, merchants and the different manufacturers' unions on Monday, August 10th and with this end in view a sub-committee was elected to interview the manufacturers and report at the next meeting which will be held two weeks from last night.

On Tuesday, Aug. 11th the World's champion Athletics will be here and a big baseball parade is planned.
On Wednesday the Fraternal Societies will hold their parade which they are arranging themselves.

Nothing special in the way of parades was decided on at last night's meeting for Thursday or Friday, but it is probable that parades will be arranged for these days. On Friday in all probability there will be a big military parade ending with a tattoo at Agricultural park. In this parade it is proposed to have the 38th Dufferin Rifles, 25th Brant Dragoons, new artillery, Collegiate Cadets, Boy Scouts and Boy Knights of this city only, which would make a splendid parade.
At the next meeting the programme for these two days will be dealt with more fully.

MAY STOP LIQUOR

Brantford Armories May Become Dry by Order of Col. Hughes

To further the cause of temperance amongst the rank and file of the militia, Colonel, the Hon. Sam Hughes said that he was seriously thinking of issuing an order forbidding the sale of intoxicating liquor in the drill halls throughout the Dominion.
"There are several drill halls in which the officers do not allow liquor to be used, but, as I have said, we are seriously thinking of closing it out of all the drill halls," said the Minister of Militia.
Col. Hughes said he did not wish to make any comment on the order just issued by Secretary Daniels of the United States Navy, which goes into effect July 1st, and which will bar liquor from being used in the navy. "The drill hall order would banish liquor from the officers' and sergeants' messes in the Brantford armories and in a number of other places."

New Members Initiated.
Last night the Court Telephone, Canadian Order of Foresters held an initiation meeting in their lodge rooms over the Merchants' Bank at which a large turnout of members were present. About forty members of the Brantford lodge were in attendance at the meeting and six new members were received and initiated. After the regular meeting luncheon was served to the guests and speeches were made by Bros VanSomeren and Elliott of the local lodge and a number of the members of the visiting lodge.

RAISED THE MONEY

Y.W.C.A. Workers Secured Large Sum in Two Days Canvas.

"One of the most successful campaigns ever held in Association work" so was described the result of the whirlwind campaign which came to an end last night. The magnificent sum of \$116 was collected and promises which will be redeemed before May 10th, bring the total up to the neighborhood of \$3,000. In this effort two teams worked. CITY FOOD AREA BIG AMOUNT IS NEEDED

In Connection With Great Road Scheme of the Ontario Government.

Mayor Spence said the city had recently been stuck nearly \$200 for a couple of hospital accounts, one for a man in an outside city, who had only lived three months in this city, and gave it as his address; another for a Brantford man, run over by an automobile in Hamilton and treated in the hospital there. On investigation, he found Brantford had to pay. Was Brantford billing other outside places for their patients treated here?

Dr. Bell replied in the affirmative. Mr. Eddy looked into all cases and the ability of patients to pay was also entered into after they had been entered on a doctors order.

The Mayor said he was glad to know that. Other local boards, he found not so careful. In the case of the House of Refuge, he found in connection with a man who made complaints that he had been in that institution for two years and that his people were willing to pay had they been asked, but they hadn't.

It was decided to dispose of the old house and purchase a new one. On motion of Mayor Spence in view of the urgent necessities for more accommodation the building committee was ordered to go ahead at once and equip the new buildings.

Moved by Mr. Preston, seconded by Mr. Watt: That in view of the fact that a considerable sum of money will be required to complete the new buildings, and furnish the same, that a full statement of the financial requirements of the hospital be prepared by the honorary secretary, to be submitted to the city and county council at their next meetings, and that a deputation consisting of the

president, Mr. Bunnell, Dr. Bell, Mr. Reville and Mr. Sandersoh and the mover be appointed to wait on these bodies and request such action on their part as will meet the necessities of the situation. Carried.
