Not content with looking on, the King siezed a shovel, and, for a considerable time, worked hard at feeding the boilers with fuel. When he had had enough he did not wonder that the men should seek a brief respite in the upper regions.

He at once took off his coat, and set the example by carrying bucket after bucket of water and worked as hard all the mcrning
