Duties—Six months' residence upon and attvation of the land in each of three ears. A homesteader may live within ine miles of his homestead on a farm of least 80 acres on certain conditions. A abitable house is required except where esidence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in cood standing may pre-empt a quarter-ection alongside his homestead. Price 300 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preception patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and arect a house worth \$300.
