

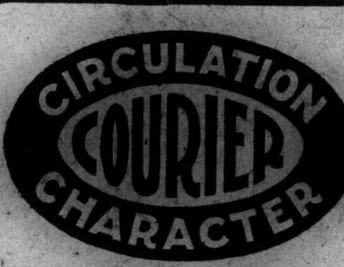

**TO USE HUN SHIPS**

Rio de Janeiro, Nov. 29.—The Brazilian government has reached an agreement with France for the use under the Brazilian flag, and for a period of one year, of thirty former German ships held in Brazilian ports for the purpose of joint action in provisioning the allied countries in order to hasten the end of the war. The vessels have a total tonnage of 250,000. It is expected that the ships will be useful for the export business of Brazil as well as adding to the carrying capacity of the Allies. All the states of Brazil have agreed to the arrangement.

### ITALIANS ABLE TO HOLD LINES

#### Foe Will Pass Only Over Dead Bodies of Defenders Says Gen. Garibaldi

Italian army headquarters in northern Italy, Tuesday, Nov. 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—A visit made to-day to the fighting front at Monte Tomba, Monte Montenera and other mountains in the fighting zone in the north and then to the Piave line, where it joins the mountain front, afforded opportunity to see this central point of the present struggle and to obtain from several at several division and headquarters direct confirmation in regard to the condition of affairs. The tour was made with a staff officer from headquarters and covered about 100 miles, with stops at the main points of fighting.

General Garibaldi, commander of the famous Alpine brigade, declared the fighting had shown that the Italian troops could hold the line beyond any question. Speaking of the spirit of his men, he added: "If the enemy ever does get past, by superior strength of guns, it will be only over the dead bodies of our troops, for they are determined never to yield."

The roads leading to the battle front showed increasing masses of troops being brought up for concentration on the threatened lines. Much artillery was coming in. The men and horses seemed to be in good condition after the hard drive. Miles of infantry moved forward, the ranks showing fresh and youthful troops. They were steel helmets, getting ready to go into action. Many had little pink boxes in their hands, which looked like packages of candy, but when they were opened, it was not candy which was seen, but live ammunition which fit into the Italian rifles. Every cartridge belt was full of these pink boxes.

Passing the headquarters of the fourth army, which hold the vital line between the Brenta and Piave Rivers, a staff officer of General Robilant, commander of this army, summed up the general situation as "satisfactory" the reports showing that the enemy was being held.

While the pressure of the Austro-German forces is still impetuous at the same time they seem to have been held down by heavy losses and the unexpected strength of the resistance they have encountered. This staff officer estimated the enemy losses as fully two to three times those of the Italians as the defensive lines always have afforded greater shelter.

### FIGHTING IN MEXICO.

Juarez, Mex., Nov. 29.—Military censorship has thrown a veil over developments between this port and Chihuahua City. Mexican officials admitted that the reports showing cut and trains had been suspended but would give no information as to the outcome of the fighting reported south of Laguna, 75 miles north of Chihuahua City, where General Hernandez was believed to have come in contact with Villa's forces.

Dead and wounded federal officers and soldiers being brought into Guaymas, Sonora, on special trains after engagements between Yaquis and federals last week, reports reaching here last night stated.
