

STAMPEDE CONTINUES

Many Locations Being Received Today

Crowd of Stakers on Milne Tract Still Throng the Gold Commissioner's Office.

Today the second contingent of stamperers, those who did not care to get mixed up in the first crush yesterday, made their appearance at the gold commissioner's office, there being a considerable crowd in front of the relocation wicket all day. At the close of business yesterday 106 relocations on the Milne concession had been accepted and nine refused, the latter being on account of the ground applied for being not open to entry. The greatest number of applications received for any one claim was on the upper half of 7 Henry gulch, for which there were five entries. Today the number will doubtless be largely increased. In the case where two or more stakers have located the same piece of ground they are profiting by the experience of others in the past. HAS PASSED OGILVIE

Mail Will Arrive Sunday Morning

Last to Leave Over the Ice is Dispatched Last Night at Midnight.

If no unusually bad luck is experienced Dawson will receive 800 pounds of mail bright and early Sunday morning. The fact that the mercury has dropped below freezing point every night for nearly a week has proven a wonderful boon to the mail carriers. It is next to impossible to travel during the middle of the day, but at night the crust is frozen hard enough so that fairly good time, considering the season of the year, can be made. The mail which left Stewart at 2 o'clock this morning arrived at Ogilvie at 11. It will presumably rest there until midnight tonight when it should have no difficulty in making Indian river by morning. From Indian river to the city, 28 miles, can be made tomorrow night. Agent Rogers received a wire last night from Todd, who is in charge of the mail, asking that he be sent an extra team, as one of his horses had been badly cut by the ice. It was Mr. Rogers' intention to send up a couple of strings of dogs, but the driver expressed the opinion that he would be able to get in with his horses. The extra team was dispatched this morning in company with the regular mail team.

THEY WERE NOT DRUNK

Say Officers of the U.S. War Ship Chicago

Misunderstanding of Languages Precipitated Trouble—Prison Full of Insects.

Venice, May 2.—In an interview the imprisoned officers of Chicago repudiated the report that they were under the influence of wine and said on the contrary they were absolutely sober. Lieut. John S. Doddridge remarked: "After the accidental upsetting of the table in the cafe by myself and companion at 11 o'clock at night we were followed and attacked by a mob and then two municipal policemen appeared. I with open hand motioned the crowd to keep off. The police then seized us but the mob continued threatening so that brother officers and a marine who happened to be on the piazza ran to our assistance. We acted only on the defensive and against the large crowd. We did not strike the police. Doubtless a misunderstanding of the two languages had something to do with the trouble. We were allowed to remain together in prison, but the room in which we were confined swarmed with insects."

Bartholomew is Given Judgment

Special to the Daily Nugget. Washington, May 2.—Vice President Vasquez of Santo Domingo, leader of the revolution against President Jimenez of that republic, has arrived at Guerra en route to the capital. The fall of the government is expected tomorrow.

Misde vs. Bartlett was placed at the foot of the list by consent. In Ripstein vs. Tilly the entire matter was referred to Charles Macdonald, master, who will assess the damages suffered tomorrow being Saturday there will be no court. Monday following the hearing of chamber motions the court of appeal will sit. From May 1 and during the summer court will convene at 10 o'clock instead of 10:30.
