MISTRESS OF THE WHITE HOUSE

Mrs. Taft, the New Mistress at White House, Will Assume Obligations as Hostess of the Nation—Washington Social Centre.

Washington, D.C., March 7.—The inaugural fuss and feathers is over; the Teddy Bear has made way for the Billy Possum and there is a new mistress in the White House.

That is not a fact to be overlooked for much more will be heard of the "first lady of the land" than has been heard during the last four years.

Mrs. Taft has no such idea. She told me she believed the White House was the official residence of the president and his family, but it could not be looked upon in any sense as a private residence.

"The wife of the president, while she has no position in the strictly official sense of the word," said Mrs. Taft, "nevertheless has obligations as the hostess of the nation which she cannot overlook nor shirk."

The views of Mrs. Taft regarding the social importance on Washington are exceedingly interesting, and if carried out, the city gradually will come to be looked upon as the real pivot of American social life.

"New York is looked upon in foreign countries as expressing the best in American social life," said Mrs. Taft, "but there are many delightful cultivated hostesses—wives of senators, officials and others—who, because of the beauty of Washington, make it their home a greater part of the year."

"It seems to me that geographically and logically, Washington should be the representative social city of the land. Here are the headquarters of the countries officials and diplomatic life and every distinguished visitor to our shores comes to Washington for a time.

"I hope one day to see it the recognized social centre of the United States."

THE HISTORY OF THE FIRST NORTHWEST COUNCIL

History of the Council of the First Northwest Council—Members Travelled by Dog Train to be Present—Some of the First Legislation—Seat of Government Moved.

The following article from the Kamack Times will be of interest to western readers:

More than three decades have been added in the big time book, during the present month since the first meeting of the first legislature for the Northwest Territories took place about 38 miles north of Kamack, at the old Swan River post of the mounted police, overlooking the valley where the Snake Creek joins the Swan.

The assembly was known as the North-west council. It was presided over by the grand old man of the west, Hon. David Laird, then lieutenant governor of the Northwest Territories. The member of that historic body were Col. Richardson, stipendiary magistrate; Matthew Ryan, stipendiary magistrate, and Col. James F. Macleod, commissioner of mounted police.

The present lieutenant governor of Saskatchewan was present at that meeting. The council met in the room of the house occupied by the lieutenant governor and staff.

Colonel Macleod made a long journey to be present. Travelling from Fort Macleod down to Benton, Mont., then along the Missouri river route that led to Bismark, then by stage to Grand Forks and Winnipeg, then along the old mail route to where Gladstone now is.

At this point, he and his estimable wife who accompanied him from Winnipeg, were met by Wm. Favel in charge of three dog trains, who brought them into Swan river barracks safely in eight days.

It was a bright morning when the three dog trains came trotting along with their distinguished travellers, jingling bells, the drivers jogging along behind bringing a long journey to a close.

The travellers were a little weather beaten but were joyfully received, and to many anxious enquirers about the journey, they assured everyone they were never better and enjoyed the journey by dog train splendidly.

A few days after Col. Macleod's arrival this notable council met—no galloping aides, no carriages, no cocked hats, no guards of honor or booming guns.

These four plainly dressed members of the first parliament of the territories met quietly in the governor's house to pass such legislation that would be best for the existing conditions at that time and laying the foundations for what is here today—law and order.

Among the visitors in the city at present are President George Morag and Secretary John C. Saul, of the Motag Publishing Company, of Toronto, and several other prominent eastern publishers and printers who are here to attend the school book enquiry.
