WASHINGTON MISSION.

Sir Wilfrid Will Try to Get Everything Settled.

Not Only the Behring Sea Question, But the Alien Labor Law, the Sealing Privilege and All Other Little Causes of Trouble Between the Two Countries Are to be Settled Here in a Friendly Spirit.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 8.—The authorities here have been advised that the arrival of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Louis Davies and other officials of the Dominion of Canada is to have an important bearing not only on the Behring Sea settlement but on all the pending questions which have been sources of international complications between the United States and Canada, namely, the passage of alien laborers and from Canada, the North Atlantic fisheries question, the presence of many American fishermen in the Klondike territory belonging to Canada and in the mining regions of British Columbia, the fisheries trouble along the Oregon coast, the bonding controversy over rights in the Fraser River, British Columbia, and in the Puget Sound, and also the question of a redemptive arrangement between the United States and Canada. There is direct and definite information that Sir Wilfrid comes prepared to take up all these questions, and to make a general settlement, whereby the constant friction they have engendered may be overcome. On some of these subjects he will confer with President Roosevelt, and on others with the Secretary of State. It is believed that Sir Wilfrid's mission was communicated to the officials here by process fully authorized by the Premier's plans, and it can be said that the suggestion is entirely acceptable to the Canadian government. The settlement of existing disputes between Canada and the United States must be the result of the administration.

While the Behring Sea settlement occasioned much anxiety and uneasiness, the Canadian authorities are more than ready to do their utmost to settle the far western territory, where the sealers fish a percentage of the so-called Canadian sealers from Seattle, San Francisco and other ports, who fit out in Canadian ports under the British flag. What Sir Wilfrid has to say on this subject is not disclosed, but little doubt, it is said, is felt by the Canadian government that the settlement can be reached.

Among the plans suggested is that of indemnity for the sealers and retire them from business. With a view to this, the United States, Russia, Japan, Great Britain and Canada would be together in an agreement of pelagic sealing. There is no determination, however, to advance this plan in preference to others.

The matter of the settlement will remain in doubt until the negotiations open. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his associates will urge strongly that the border issue point with Canada be settled by the President. Under the Premier's direction the Canadian Parliament will pass an alien labor law last spring, by which American contractors and American laborers are barred from competing in the work on the Crown's West Pass Railway, a Government undertaking in Western Canada.

On the other hand, it is claimed by the Canadians that about 60,000 Americans are on the Klondike territory belonging to Canada, and that fully 10,000 American contractors are working in the mines of British Columbia. The United States immigration laws, it is asserted, are administered with harshness by the Canadian border and are a daily source of irritation. Sir Wilfrid, therefore, suggests that the causes of irritation be removed on both sides, and it is understood that he is prepared to offer a repeal of Canadian restrictions in the Klondike and other regions if the administration of the American law is made more lenient.

On the matter of reciprocity the general purpose of the negotiations will be to give the United States a benefit of the minimum clause of the present Canadian law in exchange for the 20 per cent. reduction allowed under the Dingley law. The desire of Sir Wilfrid and his associates will be to confer the arrangement to a few important articles, allowing time to develop its beneficial and extend its scope. On the part of Canada, the articles likely to be proposed are reciprocity in fish, coal, lumber and barley. On the part of the United States the articles are coal, oil, corn, railway and electrical supplies, and other articles of kind, such as iron, implements, native woods, watches, clothing and other articles of iron and steel. The Canadian law permits a one-eighth reduction of duties this year, and one-fourth reduction next year, to such countries as give advantage to the United States in present British goods get this reduction, while American goods do not.

The North Atlantic fisheries controversy is of long duration. It took a momentary aspect some years ago, and at that time a fisheries commission was appointed, and under its auspices a treaty was made, which was a temporary settlement. The matter is still in operation, and under the American vessels may pay a license to the Canadians for the privilege of trans-shipping at Canadian ports, taking fish, etc. The license system has proved to be a hardship, and efforts will be made to reach a more satisfactory system.

It has been known to the officials here that the Canadian Premier came to Washington desiring of adopting a plan of amending the Behring Sea settlement, which was proposed by Mr. Blaine. That of amending the Behring Sea settlement will be settled by a commission.
