





MAMMALS THAT FLY.

Won't Thrive in Captivity, So Rarely Seen.

The name flying squirrel is given o many species of little mammals to many species of little mammals found in different parts of the world, all belonging clearly to the rodent animals of the squirrel tribe, but have ing scarcely any point of resemblanc, except the existence of a membrane which extends the skin from the flanks and performs the functions of a par achute

The curious flying squirrel of Aus tralia dwells in trees, seeks its food at night and feeds on insects, berries and the eggs of small birds.

It has a fleecy fur of whitish tinged with red. Its long bushy with prehensile extremity serves rudder when it flies from one tree to another and also enables it to cling to the branches while having free us its feet. It has a ventral pouch for carrying the immature young.

The strange parachute dlack-ens the descent and the squirrel lands on a branch without the slightest shock to it as a result of its leap through

Observers do not agree on the max imum flight of these animals, but appears to have been proved that they can fly a distance of from seventy-five to one hundred feet, though some claim for them a much greater tance. 
