sympathy with the Boers was held last night in Faneuil hall, Geo. F. Hollis, ex-United States consul at Preforia, and Geo. Fred. Williams were the principal speakers. Senator Geo. F. Hoar and Thos. Wentworth Higginson sent letters of sympathy. Mr. Hoar wrote from Washington :

"I cannot properly leave my duties here, even to accept your most attractive invitation to speak at Faneuil ball and to meet the men who are to express their emypathy with the gallant people, a republic of 1,000,000 against an empire of 400,000,000 who are making the best fight since Thermopylae for a cause as holy as that for which Leonidas and his Spartans gave their

Resolutions emboding the sentiment of the meeting were adopted and copies will be sent to President McKinley, President Kruger, President Steyn, Dr Leyds ard Joseph Chamberlain. The

"Resolved, that in the name of lib erty, sacred always on the soil of Mas-sachusetts, we condemn and denounce the action of England—the bully among the nations—fresh from the interna-tional peace conference at The Hague, an arrogantly attacking the sovereign

That while we hope every moral support possible will be afforded by the people of free Accerica to their breththeir heroic struggle, we urge on President McKinley and his cabinet the necessity for the strictest construction of the neutrality laws against England, until the power of the American republic may not, even by silence which be misrepresented or misund stood, be thrown into the scale against the people of our sister republics of South Africa.

"That as American citizens we pro test the seizure in the most arrogant manner of American goods by English warships and call upon our government to secure prompt and ample reparation for such high-handed action."

London, Jan. 19.-The Standard's pecial correspondent at Modder River eays to-day: - 'Otez-la; 'Depechez yous" ("Say, there, bring her over") and similar commands and exhorta-tions in English, Canadian and French, greeted our ears at Orange River station while a train was being boarded by the Gordons, who were going to the front. The Canadians had ar the front. The Canadians had arrived the day before from De Aar, and in one day had laid and completed a mile and a quarter of railway and built a new platform. Railway making under a South African sun in December is no play, and the sight of these sons of the north handling sleepers and rails with the greatest despatch and enthusiasm, working as white men seldom work in South Africa, was ar object lesson of the thoroughness of object lesson of the thoroughness of spirit and patriotism animating all racks and sections of the British force new fighting the Boers. COWARDLY TACTICS."

London, Jan. 19.—The following despatch has been received from Mafeking, under date of Jan. 3:—The enemy beggn a renewed and vigorous bombardment January 1st, and deliberately fired six nine-pounder shells into the women's laager, killing a little girl and wounding two children.
