A NEW WEED PEST.

The farmers are threatened with another weed, which, if allowed to gain the same ground that thistles, rag burdock, golden rod, wild oats, and the later sweet clover have obtained, will prove a great detriment to farmers. This is common chicory, and the professors at the Agricultural College have been asked how it can be eradihave been asked how it can be cradi-cated. They recommend the following treatment where grain fields are in-fested: Plough some time in August; cultivate two or three times and late in the fall rib up as for turnips. The following year but in some hoed crap, and thorough cultivation will mater-ially reduce the number of plants, and in a few years in all probability the in a few years in all probability the country will be free from this pest.

MADE A BIG SEIZURE. The D. G. S. Petrel, Capt. E. Dunn, came into the Eau Friday night, after making a good haul of tug, men, gill nets and fish at 3 p. m. Thursday near Long Point Cut Light. The tug, Kate Wilson, of Erie, Penn., two years old, owned by her captain, of Erie, was detected lifting her nets three miles west of the cut light and about eleven miles west of the cut light and about eleven miles to the southward, nearly five miles to the north of the boundary line. She was seized and a crew of the Petrel placed in charge. The balance of the nets and fish were lifted and brought to Part Stanley harbor at 1 o'clock to Port. Stanley harbor at 1 o'clock this morning. The tug is valued at \$3,000. One thousand dollars' worth of twine and \$200 worth of fish was seized.
